

Handel's Messiah - 250 Years Later

The Music and Story of the Most Famous Oratorio of All Times

Messiah was composed by George Frideric Handel in 1742 in the space of approximately three weeks. Its popularity has endured various interpretations and performances. Unique in music history, it has appealed to both popular and learned audiences.



THE CIRCLE OF FIFTHS

Soprano, Elisabeth Comeaux, a Rochester, Minnesota native, unexpectedly became a professional opera singer in 1985. She had planned to pursue graduate studies at Indiana University after completing her degree in music performance at the University of Minnesota, but she was chosen for the role of Pamina in the Minnesota Opera's touring production of Mozart's *The Magic Flute*. The rest is history, as the saying goes. Elisabeth has performed over twenty major operatic roles for opera companies in St. Louis, Omaha, Fort Lauderdale, Houston, Boston, Washington and Minnesota, among others. As a soprano soloist for the Plymouth Music Series, she has had leading roles in Copland's opera *The Tender Land*, in Mozart's *La finta giardiniera*, and in Britten's *Paul Bunyan*. She is also featured in the Virgin Classics/Plymouth Music Series' recordings of the Copland and Britten operas.

Philip Brunelle, founder and artistic director of the Plymouth Music Series of Minnesota, has just returned from conducting the Swedish Royal Opera at the Dresden Spring Festival at the historic SemperOper in performances of Gustav Wasa by the 18th century German composer Naumann; he also conducted the Royal Opera in the Virgin Classics recording of the same work earlier in the year. The Plymouth Music Series is an organization established for the performance of rarely-heard and newly-commissioned works for chorus and orchestra. Over its 23 years, the Music Series has been awarded many honors, among them the 1988 Gramophone Award for Best Opera Recording for Britten's Paul Bunyan and a nomination for a 1982 Grammy Award in the Best Contemporary Composition category for the recording of Dominick Argento's Te Deum.

Mr. Brunelle maintains an active international career as performer, conductor and teacher; he serves as Organist/Choirmaster for the Plymouth Congregational Church in Minneapolis as well. Regarded as a leading proponent for choral/orchestra music and in expansion of the repertoire, Mr. Brunelle was recently nominated by President George Bush to serve on the National Council for the Arts, a panel of 26 national experts in the arts who oversee the work of the National Endowment for the Arts.
