sit PSALMODY

> Psalm 141, pp 145-146 "Let my prayer rise . . ." The entire psalm is sung by all. After the psalm, there is silence for reflection; then the leader prays the psalm prayer, and all respond Amen.

Psalm 100, page 263 The psalm is sung by the choir in a setting by Herbert Howells ("Jubilate Deo," Collegium Regale). Silence and the psalm prayer follow.

HYMN #560 Oh, that I Had a Thousand Voices After the organ introduction, all stand to sing the hymn. All sing st. 1,3,5; men sing st. 2, women joining at "O soul and body . . ." women sing st. 4, men joining at "My utmost powers . ."

sit READINGS

Ezekiel 17: 22-24 Mark 4: 30-32 *The readings conclude:* L: The Word of the Lord.

C: Thanks be to God!

Comment on the readings follows, and then silence for meditation. The choir then sings "Draw Us in the Spirit's Tether" by Harold Friedell (the text may be followed at #763 in HYMNAL SUPPLEMENT 1991). The service then continues at the top of page 147 with the verse, "In many and various ways . ."



The Reverend Professor Paul Reuter

(1879 - 1959)

Paul Reuter was a distinguished musician, teacher, linguist, and pastor of the Lutheran church. He was born in Buenos Aires, Argentina, and received his formal education at the Latin Gymnasium, Hamline, Germany; Concordia College, Milwaukee, Wisconsin; and Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, Missouri. After ordination as a Lutheran minister at the age of 21 he served congregations in Nebraska and Wisconsin. His long service at Concordia Teachers College, Seward, Nebraska (1908 to 1949) included teaching of piano, hymnology, liturgy, and German.

The Reuter household in Seward, which included eight children, served for many years as a congenial gathering place of students, colleagues, and friends. Professor Reuter often entertained in his home prominent musicians of the day, particularly those from Europe, such as the legendary pianists Walter Gieseking, Egon Petri, Maurice Dumesnil, the Flonzaley String Quartet, and the pioneer American choral director, F. Melius Christiansen.

The distinguished organist, Robert Reuter, son of Paul Reuter, served for many years on the faculty of Chicago Musical College of Roosevelt University. Robert Reuter performed as guest organist at Lutheran Summer Music -1989. Gary Bordner is a member of the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra and has served as the Orchestra's Principal Trumpet since 1980. He has been featured as a soloist with the Orchestra in recordings of Aaron Copland's <u>Quiet City</u> and Dmitri Shostakovich's <u>Piano Concerto No.1</u>, both on the Teldec label. Mr. Bordner is a graduate of Augustana College, Rock Island, Illinois, and the Eastman School of Music. He currently is an affiliate faculty member of the University of Minnesota and of Bethel College. He has been associated with Luthern Summer Music in past summers.

Terry Everson will become Assistant Professor of Trumpet at the University of Kentucky in August, 1994. Winner of three international solo competitions, including that of the International Trumpet Guild, he has also performed in ensembles including the Chestnut Brass Company (quintet), the Philadelphia Orchestra, and the H.B. Smith Cornet Band. He is a second-year faculty member of Luthern Summer Music.

Martin Jean is Assistant Professor of Music and University Organist at Valparaiso University. He won the Grand Prix de Chartes Competition in 1986, and the 1992 National Youth Artists Competition in Organ Performance. He has been organ instructor for Luthern Summer Music since 1991.

Jana Holzmeier, a graduate of Indiana University, is completing doctoral work at the University of Texas. She is Instructor of Voice at Augustana College, Rock Island, Illinois. She has had extensive experience in operatic and oratori singing. Her work with Luthern Summer Music began in 1992.


