





A: Go in peace. Serve the Lord. C: Thanks be to God!

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In our celebration of the Holy Communion we receive the crucified and risen Christ, truly present in the bread and wine of this Sacrament for the forgiveness of sins and the strengthening of our faith and life.

Baptized and communing Christians who wish to receive the Sacrament today may approach by the center aisle to receive the body of Christ from the presiding minister in the palm of the hand. Those drinking from the cup then go to the *first* chalice (nearest the presiding minister) to receive the blood of Christ, and assist by tipping the chalice at its base. Those receiving by intinction (dipping the bread into the cup), go to the *second* chalice on either side. Those who do not wish to commune are welcome to receive a blessing. Please approach with open hands to receive the elements, with folded hands to receive a blessing.
