Rick Andrews is Director of Keyboard Activities at Augustana College, Sioux Falls, SD. He completed his graduate degrees at Southern Methodist University and the University of Colorado. He has won high honors at major competitions and festivals, including the Beethoven International Sonata Competition, and has been named a Gold Medalist at the International Piano Recording Competition. Before coming to Augustana Dr. Andrews taught at Georgia College, Arkansas College, the University of Arkansas at Little Rock, and the Interlochen Music Camp. (LSM '95, Piano)

Monty J. Barnard, Professor of Music at Augustana College, Sioux Falls, SD, from 1969 to 1993, earned the MM degree at the American Conservatory, Chicago, and the Mus.Doc. in vocal performance at Northwestern University. He made his Carnegie Hall debut in 19981, and has sung numerous solo roles in oratorios and made frequent appearances as soloist with the South Dakota Symphony. Dr. Barnard also is the summer soloist with the Sioux Falls Municipal Band and serves as Choirmaster for Calvary Episcopal Cathedral and as Director of Music for high holyday services at Mt Zion Synagogue. (LSM '93, '95, Voice, Sine Nomine Vocal Ensemble)

Brian Barclay, a native of Santa Rosa, CA, received undergraduate and graduate degrees in Piano Performance from the University of Southern California. He won numerous prizes and scholarships in the Los Angeles area, and since moving to New York in 1981 he has cultivated a solid reputation there as a recitalist and chamber musician. He made his Carnegie Hall debut in February, 1995. He currently is a member of the piano faculty at Turtle Bay Music School in Manhattan and is Piano Program Head at Poly Prep Country Day School in Brooklyn. (LSM '93, '95, Piano)

Diane Cawein is Assistant Professor of Clarinet and member of the Moran Woodwind Quintet at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. A native of Florida, she received her MM from Northwestern University and is a DMA candidate at Florida State University. She has held positions in the Florida Orchestra, the Naples Philharmonic, the Tampa Bay Chamber Orchestra, the Tallahassee Symphony, and the Chicago Civic Orchestra. (LSM '94-'95, Clarinet, Movere Woodwind Quintet)

S. Blake Duncan is Instructor of Oboe at Bradley University in Peoria, IL, and a DMA candidate in Oboe and Music Technology/Composition at the University of Illinois. He holds graduate degrees from Binghamton University, NY (MM), and Trinity Lutheran Seminary, Columbus, OH (MDiv). His extensive orchestral experience in Illinois, Ohio, and New York includes appointments as Solo English Horn as well as Principal Oboe. He performs with the professional double reed ensemble WIZARDS! which has just completed a CD recording. (LSM '95, Oboe, Movere Woodwind Quintet)

Terry Everson is Assistant Professor of Music at the University of Kentucky, Lexington. First prize winner of the Louise D. McMahon International Music Competition and of the Ellsworth Smith International Trumpet Solo Competition, he has performed approximately thirty solo engagements since 1988, including a full recital (1989) and a world premiere (1993) at International Trumpet Guild conferences. He has also performed in ensembles including the Chestnut Brass Company (quintet), the Philadelphia Orchestra, and the H. B. Smith Cornet Band. His recordings include a solo CD released by the International Trumpet Guild and Chestnut Brass Company recordings on the Musical Heritage Society and Crystal Records labels. He holds the MM degree from Ohio State University. (LSM '93-'95, Trumpet, Praetorius Brass)

Jana Holzmeier, soprano, is a member of the voice faculty at Augustana College, Rock Island, IL. She received her Master's degree in Vocal Music Performance at Indiana University and is currently a doctoral candidate at the University of Texas-Austin. She has sung numerous opera and oratorio roles in Rock Island and Austin and is also a member of the DaCapo Chamber Music Group. In 1991 she was named an Emerging Young Artist at the Victoria Bach Festival in Texas, and has since been chosen as a Young Artist/Apprentice by the Austin Lyric Opera. (LSM '93-'95, Voice, Sine Nomine Vocal Ensemble)

Carl Iba is Adjunct Instructor of Violin at Augustana College and at the University of Sioux Falls, SD. A graduate of Indiana University, he has served as Concertmaster of the South Dakota Symphony, the Harrisburg (PA) Symphony, the Lancaster Opera Orchestra, and the Maryland Symphony. He has also performed as First Violin of the Susquehanna Quartet, the Franklin Quartet, and the Commonwealth Quartet, and as Second Violin in the Dakota String Quartet. (LSM '95, Violin)

Anna Mooy, mezzo-soprano, is a member of the voice faculty at St.Olaf College in Northfield, MN, and has concertized extensively in the midwest. A member of the Dale Warland Singers since 1988, she earned her undergraduate and graduate degrees at Brigham Young University. She made her debut performance with the St.Paul Chamber Orchestra in December of 1994. (LSM '94-'95, Voice, Sine Nomine Vocal Ensemble)

Ann Pesavento is Associate Professor of Music at Gustavus Adolphus College in St.Peter, MN, where she coordinates woodwind activities and teaches theory, music education, and bassoon, and performs in Tre Kroner Kvintetten, the faculty woodwind quintet. Dr. Pesavento is Principal Bassoon of both the Mankato Symphony and the Minnesota Valley Wind Symphony, and she has been a member of Harmonia Mundi Chamber Winds and other ensembles in the Twin Cities. She holds a doctorate in Bassoon Pedagogy from the University of Northern Colorado. (LSM '91-'95, Bassoon, Movere Woodwind Quintet)

Lori Ronning is an Instructor of Music at St.Olaf College in Northfield, MN. A member of the piano faculty, she previously served in a similar capacity at Carnegie Mellon University. She is a graduate of Oberlin College Conservatory and the University of Michigan. As ensemble pianist she has performed with the Pittsburgh Chamber Music Project, the YMCA Artist Series, Music from Oberlin touring ensemble, and the Schubert Club Artist Series. (LSM '92-'95, Piano)

Robert Satterlee is an Assistant Professor of Music at Augustana College, Rock Island, IL, where he teaches piano, music theory, and music appreciation. Dr. Satterlee holds degrees in piano performance from Yale University, Peabody Conservatory, and the University of Missouri-Kansas City Conservatory of Music. He performs regularly in the Midwest and on both the East and West Coasts, and has been awarded prizes in many competitions, among them honors in the St. Louis Symphony Young Artists Competition. (LSM '90-'95, Piano)

Shari M. Speer, soprano, was a member of the voice faculty at Augustana College, Rock Island, IL, this past year and taught previously at Luther College, Decorah, IA. She earned her MM degree from the Westminster Choir College, Princeton, NJ, where she also service in the Artist Faculty of the Conservatory. Her numerous opera and oratorio roles include guest appearances with orchestras in Iowa and Tennessee and in summer festivals in the midwest. She now resides in St. Paul, MN, where she teaches voice and sings with the Minnesota Chorale and the Kantorei. (LSM '95, Voice, Sine Nomine Vocal Ensemble)

Esther Wang, a member of the piano faculty at the University of Wisconsin-Platteville, is a frequent soloist and chamber musician on the East Coast and the Midwest. She is a DMA candidate at the University of Cincinnati, where she received her MM degree. As a chamber musician she has performed with principal members of the Cincinnati Symphony, New York Philharmonic, Royal Danish Orchestra, Winnipeg Symphony, and the former LaSalle String Quartet. As a soloist she is the recipient of numerous awards including the Lili Kraus Performance Award. (LSM '95, Piano)

Oliver Worthington, tenor, is Adjunct Instructor of Voice at Southwestern University in Georgetown, TX, and a DMA candidate at the University of Texas-Austin. He holds the MM degree from the New England Conservatory of Music, and has sung oratorio and numerous operatic roles there, in Austin, and in Aspen. (LSM '94-'95, Voice, Sine Nomine Vocal Ensemble)






