Doosook Kim received her artistic education at Seoul National University in South Korea, Arizona State University, and at various masterclasses. She performed at numerous festivals, including Spoleto/Italy, the Colorado Music Festival, and played as a fellow at the Tanglewood Music Festival. Besides serving as Concertmaster of the South Dakota Symphony Orchestra and first violinist of the Dakota String Quartet, Ms. Kim actively performs as a soloist and chamber musician. She also serves on the faculty of Augustana College in Sioux Falls.

Frederick Ripley is an active performer of both the violin and viola, appearing regularly as a soloist, recitalist and chamber musician. He holds the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Iowa, with additional degrees from the University of Akron and the University of Minnesota. For the past two years, he has served as Assistant Professor of Strings and Music Literature at South Dakota State University.

James Hogg has given solo recitals throughout Arizona, England, and Austria, and has played with numerous ensembles, including the Orchestra of the Vienna State Opera, Vienna Chamber Orchestra, Vienna Elm Ensemble, and the Camille String Quartet. He has earned the Bachelor Degree with Honors from the Guildhall School of Music and Drama in London.

Karen Becker is an active soloist and chamber musician, having performed at International String Workshops in Norway, Switzerland, and England. She has served as principal cellist of the Texas Cello Choir, performing for the American String Teachers National Convention. She holds degrees from Ohio University and the University of Texas at Austin and is currently Assistant Professor of Cello at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

Robert Satterlee has recently been appointed to the piano faculty of Bowling Green State University in Ohio. He has performed regularly throughout the Midwest and West as a solo recitalist and chamber musician, earning critical acclaim for his "tremendous technique" and "wonderful approach to Chopin."

Kevin Wass, tuba Seth Beckman, piano **Todd Craven** is Principal Trumpet of the Florida West Coast Symphony and the Florida Brass Quintet. He has been a prize winner in many solo competitions, including Second Prize at the Ellsworth Smith International Trumpet Solo Competition and First Prize in the International Trumpet Guild Solo Competition.

Paul Morton's wide variety of experience includes performances with the North Carolina Symphony Orchestra, Classic Brass Quintet, Ringling Brothers Barnum and Bailey's Circus Band, and Crimson Dixieland Stompers. For the past three years, he has served as Assistant Professor of High Brass at Bemidji State University.

Allen French teaches at the University of Nebraska in Lincoln and performs with the Moran Woodwind Quintet and UNL Faculty Brass Quintet. He has also played with the Stuttgart State Theatre Orchestra and served six years as Principal Horn of the Charleston Symphony Orchestra.

Laurie Penpraze currently holds the position of Second Trombone in the Southwest Florida Symphony Orchestra and has been Acting Second Trombone of the Florida West Coast Symphony for the 1997-98 season. Dr. Penpraze is a graduate of the University of Michigan and recently completed a solo tour of Lithuania.

Kevin Wass is tubist in the Plymouth Brass at First-Plymouth Congregational Church in Lincoln, Nebraska, and is a busy freelance artist in the Omaha-Lincoln area, performing with the Omaha and Lincoln Symphony Orchestras and the Omaha Brass Ensemble. He teaches music in the Omaha Public Schools.

Genevieve Feiwen Lee made her Paris debut in 1989 after winning first prize in the annual competition at the Ecole Normale de Musique de Paris. She has also appeared as a soloist with the São Paulo State Symphony Orchestra in Brazil and in televised concerts in Changsha, China. She is currently on the faculty of Pomona College in California.

Seth Beckman has received numerous honors and awards and performs frequently throughout the United States as a soloist, chamber musician, and accompanist. He is Associate Professor of Piano and Chair of the Music Department at Bemidji State University.

Dennis Friesen-Carper conducts the Symphony and Chamber Orchestras and teaches composition at Valparaiso University. He recently orchestrated and arranged the musical of Walter Wangerin's *The Book of the Dun Cow*, and is currently completing accompaniments for a gospel liturgy for Augsburg Fortress. Dr. Freisen-Carper holds DMA and MMus degrees from the Shepherd School of Music at Rice University and a BA from Bethel College, and has performed extensively as a jazz pianist.

Beverly Gibson is Associate Professor of Music at Augustana College and also serves as E-flat and Bass Clarinetist with the South Dakota Symphony Orchestra. She is an Artist Clinician for Buffet Clarinets and Keilwerth Saxophones, both divisions of Boosey and Hawkes Corporation.

Doosook Kim received her artistic education at Seoul National University in South Korea, Arizona State University, and at various masterclasses. She performed at numerous festivals, including Spoleto/Italy, the Colorado Music Festival, and played as a fellow at the Tanglewood Music Festival.
