The Ames Piano Quartet is managed by Joanne Rile Artists Management, Inc. Since its formation in 1976, the Ames Piano Quartet has been in residence at Iowa State University and has been awarded many state arts council grants and grants from the National Endowment for the Arts. The quartet's performance at the Music Mountain Chamber Music Festival in Connecticut was broadcast nationally on National Public Radio. The Ames Piano Quartet has also been heard in New York on WQXR's popular radio program "The Listening Room." The ensemble has recorded the music of composers such as Brahms, Schumann, Dvorák, Fauré, Chausson, and Saint-Saëns.

Violinist Mahlon Darlington is a native of Ohio and holds degrees from the Baldwin-Wallace Conservatory and Columbia University. After studying with George Poinar in Cleveland and Oscar Shumsky in New York, Darlington served in the Basel (Switzerland) Chamber Orchestra. He is currently on the faculty at Iowa State University.

Jonathan Sturm, violist, is a graduate of the Oberlin Conservatory and Eastman School of Music. He has appeared as concertmaster of the Des Moines Symphony Orchestra and the Head of Strings at Drake University where he has been Associate Professor of violin and viola. Dr. Sturm has published articles on violin pedagogy and often leads masterclasses.

Cellist George Work holds degrees from the Eastman School of Music where he also served as teaching assistant to Robert Sylvester. His principal teachers include Robert Sylvester, Paul Katz, Ronald Leonard, Gabor Rejto, and Carol Work. He has appeared as soloist with numerous orchestras in the Midwest, as well as in Taiwan, R.O.C. In the past he has often been a member of the Omega String Quartet in residence at Lutheran Summer Music.

William David, pianist, a native of Detroit, received the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Michigan where his major teachers were Gyorgy Sandor and Eugene Bossart. 

Michael Acord is Assistant Professor of Music at Morehead State University. He also serves as Principal Clarinet of the Lexington Philharmonic Orchestra, with which he has also appeared as a soloist, and is clarinetist in the Baird Winds and the Lexington Philharmonic Woodwind Quintet.

Karen Becker is an active soloist and chamber musician, having performed throughout the United States, as well as in Europe and Puerto Rico. She has been principal cellist with the Melkus Ensemble and the International String Orchestra, as well as the Texas Cello Choir. She has just completed her fourth year as professor of cello at the University of Nebraska in Lincoln.

Seth Beckman is Associate Professor of Piano and Chair of the Music Department at Bemidji State University (Minnesota). He is a recipient of numerous honors and awards, and is an active soloist and chamber musician. This is his second summer with Lutheran Summer Music.

Joseph Bognar is completing the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in piano accompanying at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, where he is a student of John Wustman. He is currently Instructor of Music at Valparaiso University in Indiana, where he chairs the piano division and teaches music theory and freshman humanities.

Todd Craven is currently Principal Trumpet of the Florida West Coast Symphony and the Florida Brass Quintet. Todd received his Bachelor of Music degree from the University of Michigan and continued graduate study at Indiana University. This is his second summer with Lutheran Summer Music. Lisa Garner has recently been appointed Assistant Professor of Flute at Texas Tech University in Lubbock. Her experience includes recent performances with El Paso Opera, El Paso Pro Musica, and Santa Fe Pro Musica Chamber Ensemble, in addition to five years of service as Assistant Professor of Flute at New Mexico State University in Las Cruces. She earned the Doctor of Musical Arts Degree from the Shepherd School of Music at Rice University in Houston where she studied with Carol Wincenc.

Cathy Collinge Herrera teaches flute, music cultures, and music appreciation at Valparaiso University, Valparaiso, Indiana. A former Fulbright Scholar, she has concertized and served on university and conservatory faculties in Latin America, Australia, England, and the United States. She earned the Doctor of Music degree at Florida State University.

James Hogg received his Bachelor of Music degree from the Guildhall School of Music and Drama in London, England, and his Master of Music from Arizona State University. He will be a C.U. Starr Doctoral Fellow at the Julliard School in New York beginning this autumn. He has won numerous awards and prizes including the Music Teachers National Association National Collegiate Artist Competition.

Timothy Lovelace is Assistant Professor of Accompanying at the University of Texas at Austin. He earned the Doctor of Musical Arts from the State University of New York at Stony Brook. He is also active as a conductor, composer, and organist.
