Michael Acord is Assistant Professor of Music at Morehead State University. He also serves as Principal Clarinet of the Lexington Philharmonic Orchestra, with which he has also appeared as a soloist, and is clarinetist in the Baird Winds and the Lexington Philharmonic Woodwind Quintet.

Joseph Bognar is completing the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in piano accompanying at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, where he is a student of John Wustman. He is currently Instructor of Music at Valparaiso University in Indiana, where he chairs the piano division and teaches music theory and freshman humanities.

Lisa Dondlinger's performances as a soloist, chamber musician, and orchestral player have led her to stages all over the world, including those of Israel, France, Germany, Belgium, Denmark, Spain, Canada, and throughout the United States. She holds a Master of Arts degree from Indiana University and a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Iowa. During the past year, Lisa served as Miss Iowa for the Miss America Scholarship Program.

S. Blake Duncan currently teaches oboe and music technology at Bradley University, Peoria, Illinois. In addition he holds the english horn chairs in both the Illinois and Peoria Symphony Orchestras and is a member of the professional double reed quartet, WIZARDS!, with whom he has recorded three compact discs on the Crystal label.

Cathy Collinge Herrera teaches flute, music cultures, and music appreciation at Valparaiso University, Valparaiso, Indiana. A former Fulbright Scholar, she has concertized and served on university and conservatory faculties in Latin America, Australia, England, and the United States. She earned the Doctor of Music degree at Florida State University.

James Hogg received his Bachelor of Music degree from the Guildhall School of Music and Drama in London, England, and his Master of Music from Arizona State University. He will be a C.U. Starr Doctoral Fellow at the Julliard School in New York beginning this autumn. He has won numerous awards and prizes including the Music Teachers National Association National Collegiate Artist Competition.

Peter Lingen teaches guitar, lute, and viola da gamba at Luther College where he has been on the faculty since 1979. He is an avid and frequently published composer and arranger.

Timothy Lovelace is Assistant Professor of Accompanying at the University of Texas at Austin. He earned the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the State University of New York at Stony Brook. He is also active as a conductor, composer, and organist.

Mezzo-soprano Anna Mooy has been a winner of numerous honors and awards, including regional finalist of the Metropolitan Opera auditions in Minnesota and Utah. Also active as a soloist in recital and oratorio, she serves as Assistant Professor of Voice at Bemidji State University.

Sangeetha Rayapati is a singer and voice teacher in Minneapolis. She received her Bachelor of Music degree from Valparaiso University in 1997 and the Master of Music degree from the University of Minnesota in 1999, where she is pursuing her doctorate. She is looking forward to performing and studying at the Mozarteum in Salzburg, Austria later this summer.
