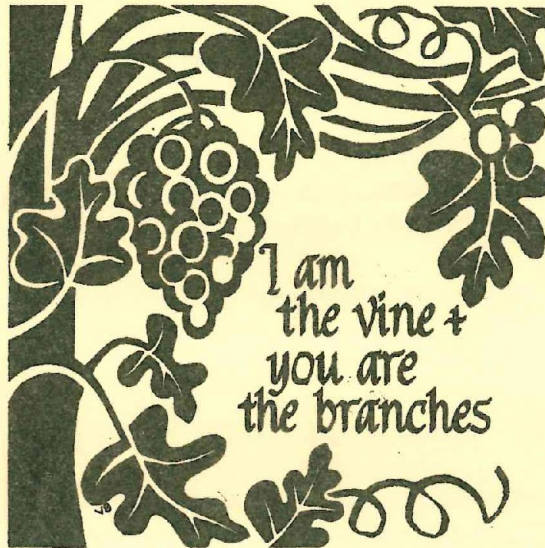

Worshippers are asked to gather in silence. A Service for Family and Close Friends is being conducted in Gloria Christi Chapel until 12:55 p.m. Your silence will be appreciated during this time.

At 1:00 p.m., as the chapel bell begins to toll all stand.

ENTRANCE “Amazing Grace”

The family, close friends of Bette and the worship leaders enter the chapel as a bagpiper plays. The lighted paschal candle, symbol of the Light of Christ, given to Bette at her baptism, leads the procession.

When the family and close friends have been seated, the congregation sits.

UNIVERSITY TRIBUTE

HYMN “O God, Our Help in Ages Past” -320 (Lutheran Book of Worship; green-covered service book)

All stand to sing the hymn. This hymn, the unofficial university hymn, is sung at the Opening Convocation of the University, at Baccalaureate Services, and at many major university functions. After singing the hymn all remain standing.

OPENING SENTENCES

- L. The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases;
- C. the mercies of the Lord never come to an end; they are new every morning. Great is your faithfulness!
- L. It is good that one should wait quietly for the salvation of the Lord.
- C. For the Lord will have compassion according to the abundance of his steadfast love:

- L. I am Resurrection and I am Life, says the Lord.
 C. All who have faith in me have life, even though they die.
 L. If we have life, we are alive in the Lord,
 C. and if we die, we die in the Lord.
 L. So, then, whether we live or die,
 C. we are the Lord's possession.

PRAYER

- L. Let us pray... God of grace and God of glory, we remember before you this day our sister Bette. We thank you for giving her to us to know and to love as a companion in our pilgrimage on earth. In your boundless compassion, console us who mourn. Give us your aid, so we may see in death the gate to eternal life, that we may continue our course on earth in confidence until, by your call, we are reunited with those who have gone before us; through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.
 C. Amen. *Then all sit.*

FIRST READING Isaiah 43:1-2, 4a

But now thus says the LORD, he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you, O Israel: Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine. When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you. Because you are precious in my sight, and honored, and I love you.

Bette Gahl Galow
April 22, 1938 - July 23, 2000

Few people have served Valparaiso University as long as Bette Galow and fewer still have served the University in so many ways.

Beginning with her days as a student leader and later evident during her employment by the University, Bette was active in the life of the University. Her activities as a student included serving as president of Alpha Phi Delta sorority, chair of the Honor Council and chair of the Union Board. After graduating with a bachelor of science degree with a major in chemistry in 1960, she was hired for the following fall term as a part-time instructor in chemistry. For most of the next 40 years she served her alma mater in a variety of roles. It is appropriate that she was awarded the University's O.P. Kretzmann Award last fall for lengthy and exemplary service as an employee.

From the chemistry laboratory, she moved to a vacation resort as gift shop manager of Pocono Crest, a University-owned facility in Pennsylvania, and then served three years as a resident director in Alumni Hall on campus. Her service to the University was interrupted only by a year as a residence hall director at Oklahoma State University and several years as a laboratory assistant at Glendale Medical Center in Valparaiso.

She returned to the University in June 1980 as a secretary in the Home Economics Department and later served as coordinator of special service for the Valparaiso University Guild. For seven years she worked in the Department of Athletics, the last three years as coordinator of women's athletics and administrative assistant to the director of athletics. After returning from England, where she spent two years as an assistant to her husband while he served as director of the University's Study Center at Cambridge, she served simultaneously as a secretary for three University programs before being appointed administrative assistant in the Office of the President. She retired in May 1998, but continued to serve the University in temporary and part-time roles in the Office of the Registrar and the Valparaiso Union.

A daughter of William and Emily Gahl, Bette was raised in suburban Chicago and was a graduate of Morton High School in Berwyn, Illinois. She married Carl Galow, whom she met on campus, on June 25, 1960. They are the parents of a daughter, Martha Galow Fuller.
