Michael Acord is currently Assistant Professor of Music at
Morehead State University, Kentucky, and Principal Clarinet of the
Lexington Philharmonic Orchestra. An active soloist and chamber
musician, he is a graduate of Morehead State University and
Michigan State University.

Lorraine S. Brugh is Assistant Professor of Music and the Kruse Organ Fellow at Valparaiso University in Indiana. She directs the Kantorei, a select choir with major worship leadership roles, and teaches organ, church music and music theory. Lorraine is an ELCA Associate in Ministry. She received her Ph.D. in Religious Studies in the Joint Program at Garrett Evangelical Theological Seminary and Northwestern University. Lorraine Brugh is the first person to be named as Lutheran Summer Music's Paul Bouman Director of Chapel Music.

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Todd Craven has received several prizes including second place in the Ellsworth Smith International Trumpet Competition and first prize in the International Trumpet Guild Solo Competition. He is currently Principal Trumpet of the Florida West Coast Symphony and Florida Brass Quintet. Todd received his B.Mus. degree from the University of Michigan and attended Indiana University for graduate studies.

David Oyen is currently Assistant Professor of Bassoon and Music Theory at Morehead State University, where he also serves as bassoonist with the Baird Winds. He has performed with the Springfield Symphony Orchestra, the Columbus Symphony Orchestra, the Lexington Philharmonic, the West Virginia Symphony and the Kentucky Center Chamber Players.

Laurie Penpraze received her B.Mus., M.M., and D.M.A. from the University of Michigan, where she studied with Dennis Smith. Formerly Assistant Professor of Trombone at Miami University of Oxford, Ohio, she is currently a Fulbright Scholar in Lithuania serving as Visiting Professor of Trombone at Lietuvos Muzikos Akademija. She will return to her position in the Florida West Coast Symphony in the fall.

Timothy Schorr recently completed his second year as Assistant Professor of Music and Coordinator of Applied Piano and Pedagogy at Viterbo University in La Crosse, Wisconsin. He made his New York debut in Weill Recital Hall in 1998, and has performed extensively throughout the Midwest as a soloist, chamber musician, and coach-accompanist. He holds the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music.

Siok Lian Tan is Assistant Professor of Piano at Miami University, Oxford, Ohio. She received her L.T.C.L. Diploma from Trinity College of Music, London, and holds B.Mus., M.M., and D.M.A. degrees from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. She has appeared as a soloist with the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra and performed in live broadcasts on Cincinnati Public Radio. Dr. Tan is an active clinician and adjudicator and performs regularly throughout the United States as soloist and chamber musician.

Esther Wang is a frequent soloist and collaborator throughout the United States. Wang received a D.M.A. at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music and currently teaches accompanying at the University of Texas at Austin. Her most recent project is preparing the Haydn Piano Variations and solo and chamber works of Jan Radzynski for forthcoming recordings.

Ruth Bonetti teaches at St. Peters Lutheran College, Brisbane. She has performed and presented seminars to help people conquer their performance nerves, throughout Australia, Europe and Scandinavia. Bonetti has authored two books and numerous articles, and she edited material for a Clarinet Syllabus. Her most recent book is Don't Freak Out – Speak Out and her next book, Practice is a Dirty Word – How to Clean Up Your Act is forthcoming in August.

S. Blake Duncan, oboe, is currently serving as an adjunct faculty member at Bradley University where he teaches double reeds, music technology and music appreciation. He holds the Solo English horn chairs of the Illinois Symphony, the Peoria Symphony Orchestra, and the Cedar Rapids Symphony, and he performs with the Prairie Ensemble Chamber Orchestra as principal oboe. Mr. Duncan is currently the organist/choirmaster at St. Matthew's Episcopal Church in Bloomington.

David D. Eaton's performance, church music and teaching career has taken him throughout the United States, the Netherlands, the Bahamas, and Germany. He has taught at the University of Iowa, Bethany College, the University of Massachusetts in Boston, and Hardin-Simmons University. As a church musician, he has served in numerous Episcopal and Lutheran parishes and has held administrative appointments at Harvard University. Dr. Eaton holds degrees from Concordia College-Bronxville, New York, New England Conservatory of Music, and the University of Iowa.

Oboist Merilee Klemp is a well-known recitalist, chamber musician, and teacher in the Twin Cities and has received numerous awards and fellowships. Following graduation from Augsburg College, she received her M.A. in Musicology at the University of Minnesota and studied oboe with Richard Killmer. Ms. Klemp is currently pursuing her DMA in Oboe Performance and Literature at the Eastman School of Music. Ms. Klemp is on the adjunct faculties of St. Olaf and Carleton College, in addition to being an Assistant Professor at Augsburg College, where she has served as Chair of the Music Department.

Tze Yean Lim is a violinist with the Wright State University
Faculty String Quartet and Lecturer of Violin at the University of
Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music (CCM) Preparatory
Department. He received his L.T.C.L. Diploma from Trinity
College of Music, London, and his B.Mus. and M.M. degrees from
CCM. He is currently a doctoral candidate at CCM. He has won
numerous scholarship awards and is heard regularly throughout the
Midwest as soloist and chamber musician.

David Oyen is currently Assistant Professor of Bassoon and Music Theory at Morehead State University, where he also serves as bassoonist with the Baird Winds. He has performed with the Springfield Symphony Orchestra, the Columbus Symphony Orchestra, the Lexington Philharmonic, the West Virginia Symphony and the Kentucky Center Chamber Players.

Soprano Sangeetha Rayapati has been an active performer and teacher in the Minneapolis-St. Paul area.
