Rebecca Hiatt McConnaughey is an active recitalist and chamber musician who champions the works of twentieth century composers, programming the songs of living Americans on most of her recitals. McConnaughey has sung with such notable conductors and composers as Theodore Antoniou, David Del Tredici and Thomas Dunn. She has taught voice and directed opera at colleges and universities in Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Indiana and is presently Adjunct Assistant Professor of voice at both Gustavus Adolphus College and Minnesota State University at Mankato. McConnaughey received the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from Boston University.

Sangeetha Rayapati is Assistant Professor of Voice and Pedagogy at Augustana College (Rock Island, IL) where she recently received a Humanities Grant to establish the Augustana Center for Singing, a resource center for voice teachers and students. In addition to teaching, she is a frequent recitalist and performer with chamber musicians and orchestras. Recent projects have included Handel's *Messiah* and *Bachianas Brasileira No. 5* by Villa-Lobos. She is the recipient of awards for study at the Mozarteum in Salzburg, Austria and a finalist in the National Association of Teachers of Singing Artist Award. Dr. Rayapati holds degrees in vocal performance from Valparaiso University and the University of Minnesota.

Timothy Schorr is Assistant Professor of Music and Coordinator of Applied Piano and Pedagogy at Viterbo University in LaCrosse, Wisconsin. He made his New York debut in Weill Recital Hall in 1998, and has performed extensively throughout the Midwest as a soloist, chamber musician, and coach-accompanist. Schorr holds the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music.

Katherine Vogele currently serves as Principal Flute of the South Dakota Symphony and the Dakota Wind Quintet. A graduate of the University of Minnesota, she is an active clinician/educator and an avid solo, orchestral, and chamber musician, frequently appearing as soloist with the SDSO, as a substitute with the Minnesota Orchestra and as Principal Flute with the Festival of the Lakes Chamber Players. Her extensive teaching experience includes positions with South Dakota State University and the University of Sioux Falls. In April 2002, she will tour southern France with the American Flute Ensemble.

Esther Wang is an active soloist and collaborator throughout the U.S. and has appeared on numerous concert series, including the Dame Myra Hess Memorial Concerts and Victoria (TX) Bach Festival. A member of the Bach Four (a consortium of pianists devoted to the works of J.S. Bach), she is currently performing and lecturing on the *Well-Tempered Clavier*. Her recording of solo and chamber works by Jan Radzynski will be released next year by Centaur Records. Wang teaches accompanying at The University of Texas at Austin.

Bruce Atwell is currently Assistant Professor of Music at the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh where he teaches private horn students, music theory, and MIDI studio techniques and coaches student chamber ensembles. He is an active chamber musician and holds the Principal Horn chairs in the Milwaukee Ballet Orchestra, the Oshkosh Symphony, and the Fox Valley Symphony. Atwell possesses a Bachelor of Music degree from California State University-Northridge, a Master of Music in Horn Performance from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, and a Doctor of Musical Arts from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. Atwell recently completed a book of etudes relating natural horn technique to modern horn technique.

S. Blake Duncan is currently serving as an adjunct faculty member at Bradley University where he teaches double reeds, music technology, and music appreciation. He holds the Solo English Horn chair with the Peoria Symphony Orchestra, and plays principal oboe with the Prairie Ensemble Chamber Orchestra. Mr. Duncan is currently the organist/choirmaster at St. Matthew's Episcopal Church in Bloomington, Illinois, and Chorusmaster for Opera Illinois.

Marion Judish has been concertmaster of the St. Cloud Symphony Orchestra for the past sixteen years. She also serves as concertmaster for the Amadeus Chamber Symphony and has performed regularly with both groups as soloist. Her most recent solo performance was the Beethoven Violin Concerto with the St. Cloud Symphony last year. Judish is currently Assistant Professor of violin and viola at St. Cloud State University. Before coming to Minnesota, she was an active studio musician for several recording companies in Colorado. She performed as soloist with the Colorado Symphony and was concertmaster of the Brico Symphony in Denver. Judish is an avid supporter of new music and has performed for the Composer's Forum in Minneapolis on several occasions. Judish holds the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Minnesota.

Miko Kominami is fast emerging as one of North America's most engaging pianists, acclaimed by *New York Concert Review* as "both a virtuosic and a musically performer." As a winner of the Artists International Award, Kominami gave her New York Debut Recital at Carnegie's Weill Recital Hall in 1996. Since then, she has concertized throughout North America and won numerous prizes including a Canada Council Arts Grant and First Prize at the 1996 Concerto Soloists' Competition in Philadelphia. Kominami holds both Bachelor and Master of Music Degrees from the Juilliard School in New York City, as well as the Piano Performance Certificate from the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto. She is currently a piano faculty member at the University of Notre Dame.

Brian Krinke presently lives and performs in New York City. Krinke has served as the Assistant Concertmaster of the Rochester Philharmonic and as Associate Concertmaster of the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra. Krinke's solo engagements have included concertos with the Buffalo Philharmonic, the Minnesota Orchestra, and the Concerto Soloists of Philadelphia. He has served on the faculty of the State University of New York at Buffalo and the Hochstein Music School in Rochester.

Eric Kutz, a highly regarded chamber musician and cellist, has captivated audiences throughout both North America and Europe. Kutz performs regularly as part of the Murasaki Duo, a cello/piano ensemble. He is a member of the Grant Park Symphony Frühlingsmorgen Gustav Mahler
