David Mennicke, conductor

Main Hall Center of Faith and Life Luther College Friday, July 18th, 7:00 p.m. This concert is framed around the Evening Prayer worship themes and texts of LSM 2003—the Vigil lessons on the salvation history from Creation to Prophecy to the Annunciation to Christ's Passion and Resurrection.

The concert culminates with the music that echoes the great ancient hymn of the church, the Te Deum, offering to God thanks and praise from heaven and earth, in life and in death, and from now and to eternity.

Throughout the concert are scattered the vigil elements of wind, water, light, earth, and fire.

David Mennicke

Enjoying his third summer at LSM, Dr. David L. Mennicke is Music Department Chair and a tenured Professor at Concordia University, St. Paul, where he has been Director of Choral Activities/Vocal Studies and Coordinator of Chapel Music since 1989. Under his direction, the Concordia choirs have been selected to perform for three MMEA conventions, three ACDA conventions, and five times with the Minnesota Orchestra. In May, 2000, the Christus Chorus performed, at the invitation and sponsorship of the cultural ministry of the Polish government, at Gaude Mater, Poland's annual international festival of sacred music, premiering works commissioned for them on Polish National Radio. The CSP choirs presented a critically acclaimed performance of J.S. Bach's St. John Passion in April, 2001.

1983 summa cum laude music major at St. Olaf College, Mennicke taught 7-12 grade music in Benson, Minnesota. His Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees are from the University of Arizona. He has studied with such eminent conductors as Kenneth Jennings, Helmuth Rilling, Robert Shaw, and Maurice Skones. He has been active in church music since childhood, presently directing the adult choirs and youth choir at Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Minneapolis.

A tenor soloist, he has sung in the Oregon Bach Festival professional choir six summers, including the choir's Grammy Award-winning recording of the premier of *Credo* by Penderecki. He has also sung solos with the Tucson Symphony Orchestra and the Arizona Chamber Choir.

Mennicke has served as a clinician and/or guest conductor for over 100 vocal and choral festivals. He was the guest conductor of the 1999-2000 Minnesota ACDA/MMEA All-State Children's Choir, choir director for the 1995, 1998, and 2001 LCMS National Youth Gathering Choirs, and guest conductor of the National Lutheran Choir in winter/spring 1998.

His publications include choral arrangements, music education materials, and church music articles distributed by Concordia Publishing House, Morningstar Music Publishers, and the AGEHR (American Guild of English Handbell Ringers).

David is a member of ACDA, MMEA, and MENC and has served ACDA (the American Choral Directors Association) in numerous capacities, notably as coordinator of six Collegiate Honor Choirs, five Student Conducting Symposiums, and nine Chamber Choir Festivals, and editor of the North Central (upper midwest) ACDA newsletter, *Melisma*. He was named "Outstanding Young Director of the Year" in 1992 by ACDA of Minnesota and was given the first ever "Creative Programming Award" by the same group in 1996.

David resides in New Brighton, Minnesota with his wife, Katherine, and their three daughters, Susanna (17), MaryLynn (15), and Christine (13), who are all attending LSM this summer!
