Acclaimed by New York Concert Review as "both a virtuosic and a musicianly performer," **Miko Kominami** is fast emerging as one of the North America's most engaging pianists. As a winner of the Artists International Award, Kominami gave her New York Debut Recital at Carnegie's Weill Recital Hall in 1996. Since then, she has concertized throughout North America, and won numerous prizes including a Canada Council Arts Grant, and First Prize at the 1996 Concerto Soloists' Competition in Philadelphia. Kominami holds both Bachelor and Master of Music Degrees from the Juilliard School in New York City, as well as the Piano Performance Certificate from the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto.

Baritone Brian Leeper's performing credits include over 20 major operatic roles throughout the United States and abroad, and oratorio appearances with acclaimed conductors Robert Shaw, Robert Page and Leon Botstein. In the past two years, Mr. Leeper has appeared as soloist in Indianapolis area performances of Beethoven's Symphony No. 9, Brahms' Requiem, Vaughan Williams' Dona nobis pacem, Schubert's Mass in G, Mozart's Coronation Mass, and with the Columbus Symphony singing selections from Bizet's Carmen. In August, 2004, Mr. Leeper will join the voice faculty at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater. He has formerly taught voice at Butler University, Anderson University, Operafestival di Roma, Western Illinois University, Nebraska Wesleyan University and Doane College. This is Brian's third summer teaching at Lutheran Summer Music.

Cheryl Lemmons is the staff accompanist at Abilene Christian University. Her teachers include Lynn Bethel Baldwin, Ronald Rathbun, Dan McAlexander, and Harold Heiberg. She has participated in master classes with such artists as John Wustmann, Martin Katz, and Seymour Bernstein. She works extensively in recitals with professionals as well as students and has accompanied numerous operas.

Laurie Penpraze is currently a member of the Florida West Coast Symphony in Sarasota, Florida. She is former Assistant Professor of Trombone at Miami University (OH) and was recently a Fulbright Scholar and Visiting Professor of Trombone at the Lithuanian Academy of Music in Vilnius, Lithuania. Laurie received her Bachelor of Music, Master of Music, and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees from the University of Michigan. This is Laurie's sixth summer at the Lutheran Summer Music Academy.

Kathryn Reed-Maxfield did her graduate work at the University of Michigan, where she studied harpsichord with Edward Parmentier and received a Masters and Ph.D. candidacy in musicology. She taught at the University of Michigan and Interlochen, and directed the docent program for the Detroit Symphony Orchestra before joining the faculty at Luther College in 1996. She currently directs the Collegium Musicum and teaches harpsichord and class piano, and performs as a solo harpsichordist and specialist in basso continuo. Esther Wang is an active soloist and collaborator throughout the United States. She received the Bachelor of Music at Baylor University and earned the Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. Wang is an enthusiastic teacher and adjudicator. She has served on faculties at St. Olaf College, The University of Texas at Austin, University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh, University of Wiconsin-Platteville, Baylor University, the New England Music Camp, and Neighborhood Music School in New Haven, Connecticut. She performs and lectures on J.S. Bach's *Well-Tempered Clavier* as a member of *The Bach Four* and has recorded on the Centaur label. She is joining the faculty of Gustavus Adolphus College in Fall 2004.

Born in Kobe, Japan, Ayako Yonetani began violin studies at the age of five with Saburo Sumi. She made her solo debut in Tokyo at age ten after winning the Japan National competition. Dr. Yonetani received her Bachelors, Masters, and Doctoral degrees from the Juilliard School where she studied with Dorothy DeLay, Hyo Kang, and Masao Kawasaki. Currently she is an associate professor of violin and viola at the University of Central Florida and is also a member of Japan's Kioi Sinfonietta Tokyo. 2004 marks Dr. Yonetani's second year teaching at the Lutheran Summer Music Academy & Festival.

He is an active chamber musician and holds the Principal Horn chairs in the Milwaukee Ballet Orchestra, the Oshkosh Symphony, and the Fox Valley Symphony. Atwell possesses a Bachelor of Music degree from California State University-Northbridge, a Master of Music in Horn Performance from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, and a Doctor of Musical Arts from the University of Cincinnati College - Conservatory of Music.

Todd Craven is currently principal trumpet of the Florida West Coast Symphony and Florida Brass Quintet. Todd received a Bachelor of Music degree from the University of Michigan under Armando Ghitalla and the Master of Music degree from Indiana University where he studied with Charles Gorham and Steven Burns. Todd performs in Trio per Due with his wife Laurie in Lithuania and Germany, with upcoming concerts scheduled in Florida. 2003 marks Todd's sixth summer at the Lutheran Summer Music Academy.

Christiaan Teeuwsen has earned an outstanding reputation as a concert organist, teacher, and pedagogue, who is able to weave together a wealth of performance practice insights with a dynamic and fresh artistry. A native of St. Catharines, Ontario, Canada, Teeuwsen received the Master of Fine Arts and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees at the University of Iowa. He is currently associate professor of Music (Organ and Choral department) at Redeemer University in Ancaster, Ontario, Canada, and also Director of Music at MacNab St. Presbyterian Church in Hamilton, Ontario, Canada. Teeuwsen holds the endowed *Regina Holmen Fryxell and Patricia Schad Leege Chapel Organist* chair at Lutheran Summer Music Academy and Festival.

Wer reitet so spät durch Nacht und Wind? Es ist der Vater mit seinem Kind; Er hat den Knaben wohl in dem Arm, Er faßt ihn sicher, er hält ihn warm.

Mein Sohn, was birgst du so bang dein Gesicht? Siehst, Vater, du den Erlkönig nicht? Den Erlenkönig mit Kron und Schweif? Mein Sohn, es ist ein Nebelstreif.

Du liebes Kind, komm, geh mit mir! Gar schöne Spiele spiel ich mit dir; Manch bunte Blumen sind an dem Strand, Meine Mutter hat manch gülden Gewand.

Mein Vater, mein Vater, und hörest du nicht, Was Erlenkönig mir leise verspricht? Sei ruhig, bleibe ruhig, mein Kind: In dürren Blättern säuselt der Wind.

Willst, feiner Knabe, du mit mir gehn? Meine Töchter sollen dich warten schön; Meine Töchter führen den nächtlichen Reihn Und wiegen und tanzen und singen dich ein.

Mein Vater, mein Vater, und siehst du nicht dort Erlkönigs Töchter am düstern Ort? Mein Sohn, mein Sohn, ich seh es genau:

Es scheinen die alten Weiden so grau.

Ich liebe dich, mich reizt deine schöne Gestalt; Und bist du nicht willig, so brauch ich Gewalt. Mein Vater, mein Vater, jetzt faßt er mich an! Erlkönig hat mir ein Leids getan!

Dem Vater grauset's, er reitet geschwind, Er hält in Armen das ächzende Kind, Erreicht den Hof mit Müh' und Not: In seinen Armen das Kind war tot. Who's riding so late through night and wind? It is the father with his child; He has the boy secure in his arm, He holds him tight, he keeps him warm.

My son, why hide you your face in fear? See you not, father, the Erl King? The Erl King with his crown and train? My son, it is only a streak of mist.

You lovely child, come, go with me! What wonderful games I'll play with you; Many brightly colored flowers are on the way, My mother has for you many garments of gold.

My father, my father, and can you not hear What Erl King so softly is saying to me? Be calm, stay calm, my child; The wind through dried leaves is rustling.

Would you, fine boy, go with me? My daughters want to wait upon you; My daughters conduct each night their song fest and sway and dance and sing to you.

My Father, my father, and can you not see there Erl King's daughters, there by the tree? My son, my son, I see it clear; The ancient willows so grey do appear.

I love you, I'm aroused by your beautiful form; And if you're not willing, I'll take you by storm. My father, my father, he's clutching me! Erl King has hurt me!"

The father shudders; he rides like the wind; He holds in his arms the gasping child; He reaches the courtyard exhausted: In his arms the child was dead. Edwin Andereck teaches studio voice lessons, vocal literature, and opera workshop at Luther College. Dr. Andereck is active as a recitalist and continues to perform in opera and concert. His operatic repertoire includes both leading and supporting tenor roles. Recently he has sung Sam in Susannah, Spoletta in Tosca, and Goro in Madama Butterfly. Andereck received the Bachelor and Master of Music degrees from the University of Tennessee and the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Cincinnati.

Dr. Michelle Coletta is currently Second Clarinetist with the Oklahoma City Philharmonic Orchestra and Adjunct Music Instructor at the University of Central Oklahoma. She formerly was Assistant Professor of Music at Cameron University, and Principal Clarinetist of the Lawton Philharmonic. She has also performed with the Minnesota Orchestra, Binghamton Symphony, Waterbury Orchestra and New Britain Symphony. She enjoys teaching privately and composing. 2004 is Dr. Coletta's first summer teaching at Lutheran Summer Music.

S. Blake Duncan is currently serving as an adjunct faculty member at Bradley University where he teaches double reeds, music technology and music appreciation. Additionally he serves as oboe instructor and chair of the woodwind faculty with the Lutheran Summer Music Program. He holds the Solo English horn chair with the Peoria Symphony Orchestra and performs with the Prairie Ensemble Chamber Orchestra as principal oboe. An ordained ELCA pastor, he is currently the Minister of Music, organist and choirmaster at St. Matthew's Episcopal Church in Bloomington, Illinois, and is currently chorus master for Opera Illinois. Additionally his interests and experience span a broad spectrum from sound synthesis and MIDI technology to church music, opera, and roses.

Pianist Xiao Hu made her New York debut at the Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall. She has since performed widely as a soloist and a chamber musician. Dr. Hu received her Bachelor of Music and Master of Music degrees from the University of Cincinnati, and her Doctor of Musical Arts degree from State University of New York at Stony Brook. Her main teachers include Gilbert Kalish, Eugene Pridonoff, and Robert Spillman. Dr. Hu is on the piano faculty at Luther College.

Pianist **Du Huang** received training at the University of Cincinnati with Professors Eugene and Elizabeth Pridonoff, where he graduated with the Bachelor and Master of Music degrees with honor. He studied with Professor Gilbert Kalish at the State University of New York at Stony Brook, receiving the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in 2001. He has also studied in master classes with pianist Leon Fleisher. His chamber music coaches include Timothy Eddy, Henry Meyer, and Peter Oundjian. Dr. Huang has been an Assistant Professor of Music at Luther College in Decorah, Iowa since 2001.

He is bassoonist with the Baird Winds and has performed with the Springfield (OH) Symphony, Lexington Philharmonic, the West Virginia Symphony, Keith Brion's New Sousa Band, the New Columbian Wind Band and the Kentucky Center Chamber Players. Oyen performed as a chamber musician at the 1997, 2001 and 2003 International Double Reed Society conferences. He holds the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from The Ohio State University.
