Bruce Atwell is currently Assistant Professor of Music at the University of Wisconsin Oshkosh, where he teaches private horn students, music theory, MIDI studio techniques, and coaches student chamber ensembles. Atwell possesses a Bachelor of Music degree from California State University-Northbridge, a Master of Music in Horn Performance from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, and a Doctor of Musical Arts from the University of Cincinnati College - Conservatory of Music.

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S. Blake Duncan is currently serving as an adjunct faculty member at Bradley University where he teaches double reeds, music technology and music appreciation. Additionally he serves as oboe instructor and chair of the woodwind faculty with Academy. He holds the Solo English Horn chair with the Peoria Symphony Orchestras and performs with the Prairie Ensemble Chamber Orchestra as principal oboe. An Ordained ELCA pastor, he is currently the Minister of Music, organist and choirmaster at St. Matthew's Episcopal Church in Bloomington, Illinois.

Jeffery Meyer has been seen conducting and performing as piano soloist and chamber musician in the United States, Canada, Russia and Germany. He is presently the Artistic Director of the St. Petersburg Chamber Philharmonic and will this fall begin his tenure as Director of Orchestral Activities at Central Washington University. Jeff holds degrees in piano as well as composition, and he recently completed his Doctorate of Musical Arts at the State University of New York at Stony Brook, where he studied with Gilbert Kalish.

Du Huang received training at the University of Cincinnati with Professors Eugene and Elizabeth Pridonoff, where he graduated with the Bachelor and Master of Music degrees with honor. He studied with Professor Gilbert Kalish at the State University of New York at Stony Brook, receiving the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in 2001. He has also studied in master classes with pianist Leon Fleisher. His chamber music coaches include Timothy Eddy, Henry Meyer, and Peter Oundjian. Dr. Huang has been an Assistant Professor of Music at Luther College in Decorah, Iowa, since 2001.

Paul Morton currently serves as Assistant Professor of Trumpet at the University of Louisiana at Lafayette. Morton performs with the Acadiana Symphony, the Rapides Symphony, the Louisiana Brass Quintet, the Praetorius Brass Ensemble, and the UL Faculty Jazz Combo. Morton holds the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Alabama. Other degrees include the MM and BM from the North Carolina School of the Arts and an Artist Diploma from the Hartt School of Music. His major trumpet teachers were Ray Mase, Chris Gekker, Armando Ghitalla, Roger Murtha, and Keig Garvin. Morton has taught trumpet and jazz studies at the Academy since 1996.

A native of Kansas City, **Adriana La Rosa Ransom** completed her Bachelor of Music degree at the University of Missouri, where she studied with Nina Gordon. Since coming to Minnesota, she has pursued graduate studies with Tanya Remenikova at the University of Minnesota, and will graduate with her Doctor of Musical Arts degree in 2004. Ms. Ransom is currently on the faculty at St. Cloud State University and the MacPhail Center of the Arts in Minneapolis.

Esther Wang received the Bachelor of Music at Baylor University and earned the Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. John Bottomley is currently a freelance tubist with an active performing career as an orchestral and chamber musician. He has performed with such groups as the Cincinnati Symphony and Pops Orchestra, Milwaukee Symphony, West Virginia Symphony, Cincinnati Opera, and Ballet Orchestras and is Principal Tuba of the Richmond Symphony and the Key West Symphony Orchestra. He received his Master of Music degree at the Manhattan School of Music and his Bachelor of Music degree at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Xiao Hu received her Bachelor of Music and Master of Music degrees from the University of Cincinnati, Dr. Hu has completed her Doctor of Musical Arts at the State University of New York at Stony Brook. Her main teachers include Gilbert Kalish, Eugene Pridonoff, and Robert Spillman. She has studied in master classes with Leon Fleisher and Emanual Ax. Dr. Hu is currently on the piano faculty at Luther College.

Du Huang received training at the University of Cincinnati with Professors Eugene and Elizabeth Pridonoff, where he graduated with the Bachelor and Master of Music degrees with honor. He studied with Professor Gilbert Kalish at the State University of New York at Stony Brook, receiving the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in 2001. Acclaimed by New York Concert Review as "both a virtuosic and a musicianly performer," Miko Kominami is fast emerging as one of North America's most engaging pianists. Kominami holds both Bachelor and Master of Music Degrees from the Juilliard School in New York City, as well as the Piano Performance Certificate from the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto. Currently, Kominami serves on the piano faculty at Luther College.

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Cheryl Lemmons is the staff accompanist at Abilene Christian University. Her teachers include Lynn Bethel Baldwin, Ronald Rathbun, Dan McAlexander, and Harold Heiberg. She has participated in master classes with such artists as John Wustmann, Martin Katz, and Seymour Bernstein. She works extensively in recitals with professionals as well as students and has accompanied numerous operas.

David Oyen is assistant professor of Bassoon and Music Theory at Morehead State University. He is the bassoonist with the Baird Winds and has performed with the Springfield (OH) Symphony, Lexington Philharmonic, the West Virginia Symphony, Keith Brion's New Sousa Band, the New Columbian Wind Band and the Kentucky Center Chamber Players. Oyen performed as a chamber musician at the 1997, 2001 and 2003 International Double Reed Society conferences. He holds a Doctor of Musical Arts degree from The Ohio State University.

Esther Wang received the Bachelor of Music at Baylor University and earned the Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. She has served on faculties at St. Olaf College, The University of Texas at Austin, University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh, University of Wiconsin-Platteville, Baylor University, the New England Music Camp, and Neighborhood Music School in New Haven, Connecticut.

PROPORTOR Ayako Yonetani began violin studies at the age of five with Saburo Sumi. She made her solo debut in Tokyo at age ten after winning the Japan National competition. Dr. Yonetani received her Bachelors, Masters, and Doctoral degrees from the Juilliard School where she studied with Dorothy DeLay, Hyo Kang, and Masao Kawasaki. Currently she is an associate professor of violin and viola at the University of Central Florida and is also a member of Japan's Kioi Sinfonietta Tokyo. 2004 marks Dr. Yonetani's second year teaching at the Lutheran Summer Music Academy & Festival.
