He holds the Solo English horn chair with the Peoria Symphony Orchestras and performs with the Prairie Ensemble Chamber Orchestra as principal oboe. An Ordained ELCA pastor, he is currently the Minister of Music, organist and choirmaster at St. Matthew's Episcopal Church in Bloomington, and is currently chorusmaster for Opera Illinois. 2004 marks Mr. Duncan's tenth year at the Lutheran Summer Music Academy.

Pianist **Du Huang** received training at the University of Cincinnati with Professors Eugene and Elizabeth Pridonoff, where he graduated with the Bachelor and Master of Music degrees with honor. He studied with Professor Gilbert Kalish at the State University of New York at Stony Brook, receiving the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in 2001. He has also studied in master classes with pianist Leon Fleisher. His chamber music coaches include Timothy Eddy, Henry Meyer, and Peter Oundjian. Dr. Huang has been an Assistant Professor of Music at Luther College in Decorah, Iowa, since 2001.

Acclaimed by New York Concert Review as "both a virtuosic and a musiciantly performer," Miko Kominami is fast emerging as one of North America's most engaging pianists. Kominami holds both Bachelor and Master of Music Degrees from the Juilliard School in New York City, as well as the Piano Performance Certificate from the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto. Highly sought out as both violist and teacher, Spencer Martin, has performed and taught at numerous festivals throughout the U.S., Canada, Israel, and Europe including the Jerusalem International Symphony Orchestra, Hartwick College Summer Music Festival and Institute, the Niagara International Chamber Music Festival, and the Lutheran Summer Music Academy. Dr. Martin is presently on the faculty of Luther College where he teaches viola, violin, and conducts the Luther College Philharmonia. Dr. Martin received a Bachelor of Music Degree cum laude from Butler University, a Master of Music Degree from Wichita State University, and a Doctor of Musical Arts Degree from the University of Minnesota.

Jeffery Meyer has conducted and performed as piano soloist and chamber musician in the United States, Canada, Russia, and Germany. Jeff holds degrees in piano as well as composition, and he recently completed his Doctorate of Musical Arts at the State University of New York at Stony Brook, where he studied with Gilbert Kalish.

David Oyen is assistant professor of Bassoon and Music Theory at Morehead State University. He is bassoonist with the Baird Winds and has performed with the Springfield (OH) Symphony, Lexington Philharmonic, the West Virginia Symphony, Keith Brion's New Sousa Band, the New Columbian Wind Band, and the Kentucky Center Chamber Players. Oyen performed as a chamber musician at the 1997, 2001, and 2003 International Double Reed Society conferences. He holds the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from The Ohio State University.

Kerry Walters recently completed her fifteenth year at Bradley University where she is Associate Professor of Music. She holds the Doctor of Musical Arts degreee in Vocal Performance from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. Recent performances include the Central Illinois Bach Festival and a performance tour of Denmark with the Bradley University Chorale.

Esther Wang is an active soloist and collaborator throughout the United States. She received the Bachelor of Music at Baylor University and earned the Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. Wang is an enthusiastic teacher and adjudicator. She has served on faculties at St. Olaf College, The University of Texas at Austin, University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh, University of Wiconsin-Platteville, Baylor University, the New England Music Camp, and Neighborhood Music School in New Haven, Connecticut. She performs and lectures on J.S. Bach's Well-Tempered Clavier as a member of The Bach Four and has recorded on the Centaur label. She is joining the faculty of Gustavus Adolphus College in Fall 2004.

Max Zorin's musical education began early when he moved with his family from the place of his birth, Israel; to France in 1981. Eleven years later, in 1992, already an accomplished performer, Zorin came to the United States to continue his music education under Nelli Shkolnikova, and with full scholarship, at the Indiana University School of Music. Several years later, Max Zorin moved to New York City to complete his Bachelor's degree at The Julliard School where he became a scholarship student of Dorothy De-Lay and Naoko Tanaka. Chamber music at The Julliard School was studied under Felix Galimir and Jonathan Feldman. 2004 marks Zorin's first summer teaching at the Lutheran Summer Music Academy.
