Michael Acord is currently Assistant Professor of Music at Morehead State University and Principal Clarinet of the Lexington Philharmonic Orchestra. In addition to studio clarinet teaching, Acord teaches Music History, conducts the MSU Clarinet Choir, and performs regularly with the Baird Winds Faculty Woodwind Quintet. He also performs with the Lexington Philharmonic Woodwind Quintet, Opera of Central Kentucky, The Central Kentucky Chamber Players, and Southern Ohio Light Opera. Acord earned a Bachelor of Music Education degree from Morehead State University, a Master of Music degree in Clarinet Performance from Michigan State University, and has also studied at the Eastman School of Music. His principal teachers include William Bigham, Elsa Ludwig-Verdehr, and Stanley Hasty.

Beginning in August of 2005, Matt Hare will be director of educational programs at Lemur Music, a shop in Southern California that specializes in double basses. Matt is well know as a performer and educator. He has been on faculty at Luther College, Cornell College, and Wartburg College. He has been a regular member of the bass sections of the Quad Cities and Peoria Symphonies, and is active with many of the other symphonies of eastern Iowa and Illinois. He frequently gives recitals and masterclasses that often include his own transcriptions and arrangements. His original transcription of Mozart's fourth horn concerto has been published by Ludwin Music. 2005 marks Matt's second summer teaching at the Lutheran Summer Music Academy & Festival.

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Ray Iwazumi holds a BM, MM, and DMA from The Juilliard School and two additional masters degrees, both with 'highest distinction,' from the Brussels Royal Conservatory. His violin studies have been primarily with Dorothy DeLay, Hyo Kang, and Igor Oistrakh. He regularly performs with his sister in the "Ray and Amy Violin Duo" and is an active researcher having produced the first serious study of the Six Sonatas for solo violin of Eugène Ysaÿe.

Pianist Miko Kominami, acclaimed by New York Concert Review as "both a virtuosic and a musicianly performer," gave her New York Solo Debut Recital at Carnegie's Weill Recital Hall in 1996 as a result of winning the Artists International Award. Since then, Kominami has concertized extensively throughout North America, including performances in New York City, Chicago, Boston, and Toronto. In addition to her solo engagements, she appears frequently in the Murasaki Duo, a cello/piano ensemble. The Duo recently released its debut CD on the Centaur Records label. Kominami holds both Bachelor's and Master's degrees from the Juilliard School in New York City. She is currently a piano faculty member at Luther College and principal keyboardist of the Cedar Rapids Symphony.

Pianist Cheryl Lemmons is from Snyder, TX, and is the staff accompanist at Abilene Christian University from which she received a Bachelor of Music Education degree. She holds a Master of Music Degree in piano performance from Hardin-Simmons University. Her former teachers include Lynn Bethel Baldwin, Ronald Rathbun, and Dan McAlexander, and she has also studied with Harold Heiberg at the University of North Texas. She has participated in master classes and workshops with such names as John Wustmann, Martin Katz, and Seymour Bernstein.

Paul Morton teaches trumpet and jazz studies at the University of Louisiana at Lafayette. He performs with the Acadiana Symphony, the Louisiana Brass Quintet, and the UL Lafayette Faculty Jazz Combo. He recently performed with the St. Petersburg Chamber Philharmonic in St. Petersburg, Russia. Morton holds a Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Alabama. Other degrees include an M.M. and B.M. from the North Carolina School of the Arts, and an Artist Diploma from the Hartt School of Music. He has been on the LSM faculty since 1996.

A native of Salt Lake City, baritone **Gary Moss** has served on the faculty of UW Oshkosh. Gary completed his Master's and Doctorate degrees in voice performance at the University of Michigan. Roles include Ford in *Falstaff*, Papageno in *The Magic Flute*, Giorgio Germont in *La Traviata*, and Count Almaviva in *Le nozze di Figaro*.

Clinton Nieman graduated from Iowa State University in 2004 with a B.M. in percussion performance. He is an active performer and frequently serves as an extra with the Des Moines Symphony. Clinton has also performed with the Dubuque Colts Drum and Bugle Corps, Ames Chamber Artists, Central Iowa Symphony, and the Fort Dodge Choral Society. He has studied percussion with Barry Larkin and Michael Burritt.

Spencer Martin, viola Du Huang, piano Edwin Andereck has sung leading and supporting tenor roles in regional opera organizations such as the Cincinnati Opera, Cleveland Lyric Opera, Charlotte Opera, the Pine Mountain Music Festival, and Cedar Rapids Opera Theatre. Andereck received the Doctor of Musical Arts Degree in Voice from the University of Cincinnati, College Conservatory of Music. He is currently an Associate Professor of Music at Luther College in Decorah, Iowa, and serves as President of the Iowa Chapter of the National Association of Teachers of Singing (NATS).

S. Blake Duncan is in his 11th year with Lutheran Summer Music where he serves as oboe instructor, chair of the woodwind faculty and is the Victor H. Mattfeld Endowed Director of the Collegium Musicum. He currently teaches as an adjunct faculty member at Bradley University where he teaches double reeds, music technology and music appreciation. He holds the Solo English horn chair with the Peoria Symphony Orchestras, is the solo oboist with the Peoria BachFest and performs with the Prairie Ensemble Chamber Orchestra as principal oboe. His extensive orchestral experience includes English horn appointments with orchestras as diverse as the Caracas (Venezuela) Philharmonic, the Illinois Symphony, the Cedar Rapids Symphony, the Mansfield and Akron (OH) Symphonies and Principal Oboe with the Binghamton Symphony, Tri-Cities Opera and the Cayuga Chamber Orchestra, An Ordained ELCA pastor, he is currently the Minister of Music, organist and choirmaster at St. Matthew's Episcopal Church in Bloomington, and is currently chorusmaster for both Opera Illinois and Sugar Creek Symphony & Song Festival. Additionally his interests and experience span a broad spectrum from synthesis and MIDI technology to church music, opera and early music.

He then studied with Professor Gilbert Kalish at the State University of New York at Stony Brook, receiving the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in 2001. He has also studied in master classes with pianist Leon Fleisher. His chamber music coaches include Timothy Eddy, Julius Levine, and Peter Oundjian. Huang performs frequently in the *Unison Piano Duo* with his wife, pianist Xiao Hu. They have presented duo recitals in New York City's Carnegie Hall Weill Recital Hall and Merkin Concert Hall, United Nation in Vienna, and many concert venues in China. Dr. Huang has been an Assistant Professor of Music at Luther College in Decorah, Iowa since 2001. During the summer, he serves on the piano faculty at Lutheran Summer Music Academy and Festival.

Dr. Martin is presently on the faculty of Luther College where he teaches viola, violin, and conducts the Luther College Philharmonia. Dr. Martin received a Bachelor of Music Degree cum laude from Butler University, a Master of Music Degree from Wichita State University, and a Doctor of Musical Arts Degree from the University of Minnesota.

Laurie Penpraze is a trombonist with the Florida West Coast Symphony in Sarasota, Florida. Formerly, she was Assistant Professor of Trombone at Miami University (OH) and a Fulbright Scholar and Visiting Professor of Trombone at the Lithuanian Academy of Music in Vilnius, Lithuania. Laurie received her B.M., M.M. and DMA from the University of Michigan. She has performed at the Los Angeles Philharmonic Institute, Music Academy of the West, the Echternach Festival (Luxembourg) and the A.I.M.S. Festival Orchestra (Graz, Austria). In addition, she has been recognized in numerous solo competitions including the International Trombone Competition in Nizhny-Novgorod, Russia, as well as the American Waterways International Trombone Competition. Twice selected to participate in intensive seminars with world-renowned Swedish trombone soloist, Christian Lindberg, Laurie frequently performs as a soloist and chamber musician as a member of Trio per due with her husband, Todd Craven. Their first recording will be released in Europe this summer. This is Laurie's eighth summer at LSM.

He is currently associate professor of Music (Organ and Choral department) at Redeemer University in Ancaster, Ontario, Canada, and also Director of Music at MacNab St. Presbyterian Church in Hamilton, Ontario, Canada. Teeuwsen holds the endowed Regina Holmen Fryxell and Patricia Schad Leege Chapel Organist chair at Lutheran Summer Music Academy and Festival.

Ayako Yonetani began violin studies at the age of five with Saburo Sumi. She made her solo debut in Tokyo at age ten after winning the Japan National competition. Dr. Yonetani received her Bachelors, Masters, and Doctoral degrees from the Juilliard School where she studied with Dorothy DeLay, Hyo Kang, and Masao Kawasaki. Currently she is an associate professor of violin and viola at the University of Central Florida and is also a member of Japan's Kioi Sinfonietta Tokyo. 2005 marks Dr. Yonetani's third year teaching at the Lutheran Summer Music Academy & Festival.
