Michael Acord is currently Associate Professor of Music at Morehead State University and Principal Clarinet of the Lexington Philharmonic Orchestra. In addition to studio clarinet teaching, Acord teaches Music History, conducts the MSU Clarinet Choir, and performs regularly with the Baird Winds Faculty Woodwind Quintet. He also performs with the Lexington Philharmonic Woodwind Quintet, Opera of Central Kentucky, The Central Kentucky Chamber Players, and Southern Ohio Light Opera. Acord earned a Bachelor of Music Education degree from Morehead State University, a Master of Music degree in Clarinet Performance from Michigan State University, and has also studied at the Eastman School of Music. His principal teachers include William Bigham, Elsa Ludwig-Verdehr, and Stanley Hasty.

Bruce Atwell, has performed throughout the United States and Europe as an orchestral musician and soloist. An Associate Professor of Music at the University of Wisconsin Oshkosh, Dr. Atwell maintains a busy teaching and performance schedule, with Principal Horn positions with the Milwaukee Ballet Orchestra, the Green Bay Symphony, the Fox Valley Symphony, and as a member of the Milwaukee Horn Quartet. He has performed with the Florida Symphony, the Hong Kong Philharmonic, as Acting Fourth Horn with the Philadelphia Orchestra, and with numerous orchestras throughout the United States.

S. Blake Duncan is in his 11<sup>th</sup> year with Lutheran Summer Music where he serves as oboe instructor, chair of the woodwind faculty and is the Victor H. Mattfeld Endowed Director of the Collegium Musicum. He currently teaches as an adjunct faculty member at Bradley University where he teaches double reeds. music technology and music appreciation. He holds the Solo English horn chair with the Peoria Symphony Orchestras, is the solo oboist with the Peoria BachFest and performs with the Prairie Ensemble Chamber Orchestra as principal oboe. His extensive orchestral experience includes English horn appointments with orchestras as diverse as the Caracas (Venezuela) Philharmonic, the Illinois Symphony, the Cedar Rapids Symphony, the Mansfield and Akron (OH) Symphonies and Principal Oboe with the Binghamton Symphony, Tri-Cities Opera and the Cayuga Chamber Orchestra. An Ordained ELCA pastor, he is currently the Minister of Music, organist and choirmaster at St. Matthew's Episcopal Church in Bloomington, and is currently chorusmaster for both Opera Illinois and Sugar Creek Symphony & Song Festival. Additionally his interests and experience span a broad spectrum from synthesis and MIDI technology to church music, opera and early music.

Pianist Miko Kominami, acclaimed by New York Concert Review as "both a virtuosic and a musicianly performer," gave her New York Solo Debut Recital at Carnegie's Weill Recital Hall in 1996 as a result of winning the Artists International Award. Since then, Kominami has concertized extensively throughout North America, including performances in New York City, Chicago, Boston, and Toronto. In addition to her solo engagements, she appears frequently in the Murasaki Duo, a cello/piano ensemble. The Duo recently released its debut CD on the Centaur Records label. Kominami holds both Bachelor's and Master's degrees from the Juilliard School in New York City. She is currently a piano faculty member at Luther College and principal keyboardist of the Cedar Rapids Symphony.

Clinton Nieman graduated from Iowa State University in 2004 with a B.M. in percussion performance. He is an active performer and frequently serves as an extra with the Des Moines Symphony. Clinton has also performed with the Dubuque Colts Drum and Bugle Corps, Ames Chamber Artists, Central Iowa Symphony, and the Fort Dodge Choral Society. He has studied percussion with Barry Larkin and Michael Burritt.

David Oyen, Associate professor of music at Morehead State University (MSU), teaches bassoon and music theory. He holds a doctor of musical arts degree from Ohio State University where he studied with Christopher Weait. He is the bassoonist with the Baird Winds at MSU and performs regularly with the Lexington Philharmonic and the West Virginia Symphony. He was previously principal bassoonist of the Springfield (OH) Symphony Orchestra and has also performed with the Columbus, Roanoke, and Mansfield Symphony Orchestras, Opera/Columbus, Keith Brion's New Sousa Band, WindWorks, and OBOHIO.

Katherine Vogele is well known as an orchestral performer and chamber music collaborator. Currently Principal Flute of the South Dakota Symphony, she serves as flutist of the acclaimed Dakota Wind Quintet, is a frequent soloist with the SDSO and performs regularly as a substitute with the Minnesota Orchestra. Passionate about travel, Katherine has concertized around the world and has performed in New Zealand, the Fiji Islands and the famed Sydney Opera House in Australia. In addition, she toured as a concerto soloist throughout Malaysia and represented the United States as principal flute of the American Flute Ensemble's 2002 tour of France. She has recorded for the Innova Label and is a featured soloist on two recordings recently released by the SDSO. Her extensive teaching experience includes positions with South Dakota State University and the University of Sioux Falls. 2005 marks Katherine's sixth exciting summer teaching at the Lutheran Summer Music Academy & Festival.
