Du Huang received training at the University of Cincinnati, College-Conservatory of Music with Professors Eugene and Elizabeth Pridonoff, where he graduated with the Bachelor of Music (magna cum laude) and Master of Music degrees. He studied with Professor Gilbert Kalish at the State University of New York at Stony Brook, receiving the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in 2001. Huang teaches at Luther College in Decorah, Iowa, where he has served as an Assistant Professor of Music since 2001.

Ray Iwazumi holds a Bachelor of Music, Master of Music, and Doctor of Musical Arts from The Juilliard School and two additional masters degrees, both with 'highest distinction,' from the Brussels Royal Conservatory. His violin studies have been primarily with Dorothy DeLay, Hyo Kang, and Igor Oistrakh.

Cheryl Lemmons is from Snyder, TX, and is the staff accompanist at Abilene Christian University from which she received a Bachelor of Music Education degree. She holds a Master of Music Degree in piano performance from Hardin-Simmons University. Her former teachers include Lynn Bethel Baldwin, Ronald Rathbun, and Dan McAlexander, and she has also studied with Harold Heiberg at the University of North Texas.

Since 1998, Paul Morton serves as Assistant Professor of Trumpet at the University of Louisiana at Lafayette. In addition to graduate and undergraduate trumpet, he also teaches jazz improvisation and high brass pedagogy. Dr. Morton performs and gives master classes across the United States and recently performed in St. Petersburg, Russia with the St. Petersburg Chamber Philharmonic. Summer 2006 will mark Dr. Morton's tenth year with Lutheran Summer Music Academy and Festival.

Laurie Penpraze is currently a member of the Florida West Coast Symphony in Sarasota, Florida. She is former Assistant Professor of Trombone at Miami University (OH) and was recently a Fulbright Scholar and Visiting Professor of Trombone at the Lithuanian Academy of Music in Vilnius, Lithuania. Laurie received her Bachelor of Music, Master of Music, and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees from the University of Michigan. This is Laurie's ninth summer at the Lutheran Summer Music Academy.

Michael Acord is currently Associate Professor of Music at Morehead State University and Principal Clarinet of the Lexington Philharmonic Orchestra. In addition to studio clarinet teaching, Acord teaches Music History, conducts the MSU Clarinet Choir, and performs regularly with the Baird Winds Faculty Woodwind Quintet. Acord earned a Bachelor of Music Education degree from Morehead State University, a Master of Music degree in Clarinet Performance from Michigan State University, and has also studied at the Eastman School of Music. His principal teachers include William Bigham, Elsa Ludwig-Verdehr, and Stanley Hasty.

Todd Craven is currently principal trumpet of the Florida West Coast Symphony and Florida Brass Quintet. A prizewinner in the Ellsworth Smith International Trumpet Competition, as well as First Prize winner of the International Trumpet Guild Solo Competition, Todd has performed with the New York Philharmonic and the Cincinnati Symphony. Todd received the Bachelor of Music degree from the University of Michigan under Armando Ghitalla and the Master of Music degree from Indiana University where he studied with Charles Gorham and Steven Burns. Todd performs in Trio per Due with his wife Laurie in Lithuania and Germany.

S. Blake Duncan is currently serving as an adjunct faculty member at Bradley University where he teaches double reeds, music technology and music appreciation. He holds the Solo English horn chair with the Peoria Symphony Orchestras and performs with the Prairie Ensemble Chamber Orchestra as principal oboe. An ordained ELCA pastor, he is currently the Minister of Music, organist and choirmaster at St. Matthew's Episcopal Church in Bloomington. Additionally, his interests and experience span a broad spectrum from synthesis and MIDI technology to church music, opera and early music.

Cheryl Lemmons is from Snyder, TX, and is the staff accompanist at Abilene Christian University from which she received a Bachelor of Music Education degree. She holds a Master of Music degree in piano performance from Hardin-Simmons University. Her former teachers include Lynn Bethel Baldwin, Ronald Rathbun, and Dan McAlexander, and she has also studied with Harold Heiberg at the University of North Texas. She has participated in master classes and workshops with such names as John Wustmann, Martin Katz, and Seymour Bernstein.

Polly Meyerding is a freelance flutist and private flute instructor in Saint Paul, Minnesota. She has performed with numerous musical organizations in the Twin Cities area, both large and small. She is the creator and director of the Summer Flute Fling and Flute Intensive, and is the President of the Upper Midwest Flute Association

Matthew Sintchak joined the music faculty at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater in the fall of 2001. As a performer, Sintchak is a member of the Ancia Saxophone Quartet, Duo Nouveau, and the Intergalactic Contemporary Ensemble and has performed throughout the U.S., Canada, Japan, and Europe. Sintchak earned his doctorate from the Eastman School of Music and has also studied at the Paris Conservatory, the New England Conservatory of Music, and Boston University. He is a Conn-Selmer Company artist and has recorded for the Innova and Southport labels.

Conductor and pianist Jonathan Yates made his professional orchestral conducting debut at 23, leading the National Symphony Orchestra in a Millennium Stages Concert. The following year he made his Carnegie Hall debut as a participant in the Isaac Stern Chamber Music Workshop, and has also performed at the 92nd Street Y, Miller Theater, Merkin Hall and Bargemusic.
