Michael Acord is currently Associate Professor of Music at Morehead State University and Principal Clarinet of the Lexington Philharmonic Orchestra. In addition to studio clarinet teaching, Acord teaches Music History, conducts the MSU Clarinet Choir, and performs regularly with the Baird Winds Faculty Woodwind Quintet. Acord earned a Bachelor of Music Education degree from Morehead State University, a Master of Music degree in Clarinet Performance from Michigan State University, and has also studied at the Eastman School of Music. His principal teachers include William Bigham, Elsa Ludwig-Verdehr, and Stanley Hasty

Xiao Hu began piano studies at the age of five at her native country of China. Ms. Hu earned her Bachelor of Music (*summa cum laude*) and Master of Music from the University of Cincinnati, studying with Professors Eugene and Elizabeth Pridonoff. Later she received her Doctor of Musical Arts degree in 2003 from the State University of New York at Stony Brook under the guidance of Professor Gilbert Kalish. Ms. Hu performs regularly with her husband, pianist Du Huang, as the Universi Piano Duo.

Du Huang received training at the University of Cincinnati, College-Conservatory of Music with Professors Eugene and Elizabeth Pridonoff, where he graduated with the Bachelor of Music and Master of Music degrees. He studied with Professor Gilbert Kalish at the State University of New York at Stony Brook, receiving the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in 2001. Huang enjoys working with young pianists and musicians at Luther College in Decorah, Iowa, where he has served as an Assistant Professor of Music since 2001. During the summer, he serves on the piano faculty at Lutheran Summer Music Academy and Festival. Julie Johnson began playing the flute at the age of 10 in Graceton, MN, a small town on the Canadian border. In 1999, Julie served as co-principal flute of the Rome Festival Orchestra, having received a Career Opportunity Grant from the Minnesota State Arts Board to spend a month in Italy performing. Currently, Julie performs regularly throughout the Twin Cities with the Gerard-Johnson Duo and free-lances as a chamber and orchestral musician. She teaches at MacPhail Center for Music, the Westbank School of Music, and Mount Olivet School of Music.

Cheryl Lemmons is from Snyder, TX, and is the staff accompanist at Abilene Christian University from which she received a Bachelor of Music Education degree. She holds a Master of Music Degree in piano performance from Hardin-Simmons University. Her former teachers include Lynn Bethel Baldwin, Ronald Rathbun, and Dan McAlexander, and she has also studied with Harold Heiberg at the University of North Texas. She has participated in master classes and workshops with such names as John Wustmann, Martin Katz, and Seymour Bernstein.

Denise Parr-Scanlin is an Assistant Professor of Piano at West Texas A&M University. She received the Bachelor of Music and Master of Fine Arts degrees from the University of Georgia and recently completed the Doctor of Musical Arts degree at the University of Texas at Austin. She also studied at the American Conservatory of Music in Fontainebleau, France and with Yvonne Loriod-Messiaen in Paris. Her performances included appearances with the Atlanta Wind Ensemble, the Atlanta Symphony, and Collage Chamber Ensemble of Houston as well as recitals in France and Switzerland. In 2000 she recorded Sam Jones' Sonata for Cello and Piano with cellist Emmanuel Lopez for the Naxos label.

Matthew Sintchak joined the music faculty at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater in the fall of 2001. As a performer, Sintchak is a member of the Ancia Saxophone Quartet, Duo Nouveau, and the Intergalactic Contemporary Ensemble and has performed throughout the U.S., Canada, Japan, China, and Europe. Sintchak earned his doctorate from the Eastman School of Music with a Performer's Certificate and has also studied at the Paris Conservatory, the New England Conservatory of Music, and Boston University. He is a Conn-Selmer and Vandoren artist and has recorded for the Innova and Southport labels.

Maggie Snyder was born in Memphis, Tennessee, into a musical family and began the study of music at an early age. She spent much of her earliest years performing in recitals with her family both locally and nationally, and continues to do so yearly. She received her Bachelor of Music from the University of Memphis and her Master of Music and GPD from Peabody Conservatory. Ms. Snyder joined the Faculty of The University of Alabama as Assistant Professor of Viola in 2002 and is Principal of the Tuscaloosa Symphony Orchestra and the Meridian Symphony Orchestra (Mississippi).

Mayron Tsong has performed extensively across the United States, Canada, Sweden, Switzerland, China, Taiwan, and Russia as a soloist, chamber musician and accompanist, with performances being broadcast in Canada, the United States and Hong Kong. She holds degrees in Piano Performance and Music Theory, and she obtained her Doctor of Musical Arts at Rice University. Having served on faculty at California State University in Humboldt and as Chair of the Piano Area at the University of Lethbridge in Alberta, Canada, Dr. Tsong is currently Assistant Professor of Piano at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.
