Translations Te Deum

We praise thee, O God; we acknowledge thee to be the Lord. All the earth doth worship thee, the Father everlasting. To thee all Angels, the Heavens, and all the Powers, the Cherubim and Seraphim proclaim without ceasing: Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God of Hosts! The heavens and the earth are full of the majesty of thy glory. The glorious chorus of the Apostles, the admirable company of the Prophets, the white-robed army of Martyrs praises thee. Throughout the whole world the holy Church gives praise to thee, the Father of infinite majesty; they praise your admirable, true, and only Son; and also the Holy Spirit, our Advocate. You are the King of glory, O Christ. You are the eternal Son of the Father. To deliver us, you became human, and did not disdain the Virgin's womb. Having blunted the sting of death, you opened the kingdom of heaven to all believers. You sit at the right hand of God, in the glory of the Father. You are believed to be the Judge who will come. Therefore, we beseech you, come to the aid of your servants, whom you have redeemed by your precious blood. Make them to be numbered with they saints in glory everlasting. Save your people, O Lord, and bless your inheritance. Govern them and extol them from now into eternity. Day by day, we bless thee; and we praise your name for ever, yea, for ever and ever. Vouchsafe, O Lord to keep us this day without sin. Have mercy upon us, O Lord. have mercy upon us. Let thy mercy be upon us, O Lord, as we have trusted in thee. In thee, O Lord, I have trusted; let me never be confounded.

V. Agnus Dei Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world, grant them rest. Allen Hightower is the 2007 Phyllis and Richard Duesenberg Concert Choir Chair at Lutheran Summer Music Academy. Dr. Hightower is Professor of Music and Director of Choral Activities at Sam Houston State University in Huntsville, Texas. His responsibilities at SHSU include conducting the SHSU Chorale and Symphonic Choir as well as directing the masters degree program in choral conducting and giving administrative oversight to a growing program of four choirs. Under Dr. Hightower's leadership the SHSU Chorale has performed by invitation at three major music conventions in the past five years, including an appearance at the 2007 National Convention of the American Choral Directors Association in Miami.

Active in church music since childhood, Dr. Hightower currently serves on the music staff of Tallowood Baptist Church in Houston, Texas. He is Music Director of the Houston Masterworks Chorus, the city's largest independent chorus. This organization specializes in the performance of large-scale works for chorus and orchestra. Beginning in the August of 2007, Allen will serve as the founding Artistic Director and Conductor of the Heinich Schutz Choir of Houston. This fully professional ensemble is centered at the First Evangelical Lutheran Church of Houston.

Allen was the 1997 First-Prize winner of the American Choral Directors Association's Graduate Choral Conducting Competition held in San Diego, California. From 1997 through 2000, he served as the conducting intern with the Los Angeles Master Chorale, Paul Salamunovich, conductor. In addition to extensive studies with conductors Donald Neuen and Paul Salamunovich, conducting studies have been pursued with Joseph Flummerfelt at Westminster Choir College and with Helmuth Rilling at the Oregon Bach Festival. Dr. Hightower has earned degress from Sam Houston State University, the Eastman School of Music, Baylor University, and UCLA.

Pianist Cheryl Lemmons is from Abilene, TX, and is the staff accompanist at Abilene Christian University from which she received a Bachelor of Music Education degree. She holds a Master of Music Degree in piano performance from Hardin-Simmons University. Her former teachers include Lynn Bethel Baldwin, Ronald Rathbun, and Dan McAlexander, and she has also studied with Harold Heiberg at the University of North Texas. She has participated in master classes and workshops with such names as John Wustmann, Martin Katz, and Seymour Bernstein.

Christiaan Teeuwsen: The Regina Holmen Fryxell and Patricia Schad Leege Chapel Organist A native of St. Catharines, Ontario, Canada, Christiaan received a Master of Fine Arts degree and Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Iowa. He also received the Solo Diploma [Uitvoerend Musicus] in organ performance from the Sweelinck Conservatory in Amsterdam. During his tenure in The Netherlands he studied with Harold Vogel and Ton Koopman and was associate organist to Klaas Bolt at the Grote of St. Bavo Kerk in Haarlem. Dr. Teeuwsen is currently Chair of Music the Music Department at Redeemer University in Ancaster, Ontario, where he also teaches Harpsichord, conducts the concert choir/alumni choir and teaches courses in choral music and performance practice. He has recorded for the Selemas label (Bach meets Buxtehude: Bader Organ/1641) and Magadis label (north-german organ works on a Schnitger Orgel/1702) and the Naxos label (The organ works of Georg Böhm: Reil Orgel/1999) and is currently working on The organ

(The organ works of Georg Bonm: Rell Orgel/1999) and is currently working on The organ works of Vincent Lübeck - Naxos. He is also Director of Music at MacNab St. Presbyterian Church in Hamilton, Ontario, Canada. Catherine McCord Larsen enjoys an active career as a soloist in performances of oratorio, baroque opera, and chamber music recitals. Recent apperances include Handel's "Messiah" with the Lyra Baroque Orchestra and Arvo Pärt's "Magnificat" with the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra. She is also a member of the voice faculty at Northwestern College in St. Paul, MN, where she teaches private lessons and class voice. Ms. McCord Larsen is a former member of the Dale Warland Singers, The Los Angeles Master Chorale, and I Cantori of Los Angeles with whom she toured under Columbia Artists Management. As a member of the Screen Actor's Guild, Ms. McCord Larsen has recorded several motion picture soundtracks, including scores by John Williams and James Newton Howard, as well as numerous national commercials to her credit.




