Karen Wilkerson, soprano Cheryl Lemmons, piano

Kerry Walters is Associate Professor of Music at Bradley University in Peoria Illinois where she chairs the voice area, directs the BU Women's Choir and Opera Workshop, and teaches Diction and Vocal Pedagogy and Literature. She is a frequent concert singer in the Central Illinois region and especially enjoys performing the Baroque repertory. Recent solo performances include the Saint John Passion in early June at the annual Peoria Bach Festival and performances with the Bradley Chorale on a tour of Tuscany in May. She holds the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music.

Karen Wilkerson is an active singer, educator, and conductor in the Twin Cities area. She has performed with the Minnesota Opera and the Dale Warland Singers. Ms. Wilkerson is director of adult choirs and handbells at Saint Michael's Lutheran Church, Roseville. She is on the voice faculty of Northwestern College, and in January of 2004 was a visiting professor at Gustavus Adolphus College. Wilkerson also is on the faculty at Luther Seminary. She holds degrees from California State University, Northridge, and Westminster Choir College.

Zebulon Highben is associate musician and choirmaster at Westwood Lutheran Church in suburban Minneapolis, where he conducts four of the church's six choirs, oversees the fine and visual arts series, and collaborates in worship planning. In addition, he serves on the faculty of the University of Wisconsin – River Falls, where he directs the UWRF Men's Chorus. Zebulon holds the B.M.E. from Ohio State University (magna cum laude and with distinction) and the M.S.M. in choral conducting from Luther Seminary with St. Olaf College. He has studied conducting privately with Hilary Apfelstadt, Anton Armstrong, and James S. Gallagher. A published author and reviewer, his first published choral compositions will be released in 2008. He is a commissioned Associate in Ministry in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

Pianist Cheryl Lemmons is from Abilene, TX, and is the staff accompanist at Abilene Christian University from which she received a Bachelor of Music Education degree. She holds a Master of Music Degree in piano performance from Hardin-Simmons University. Her former teachers include Lynn Bethel Baldwin, Ronald Rathbun, and Dan McAlexander, and she has also studied with Harold Heiberg at the University of North Texas. She has participated in master classes and workshops with such names as John Wustmann, Martin Katz, and Seymour Bernstein.

Allen Hightower is Director of Choral Studies at Sam Houston State University. Passionately committed to preparing tomorrow's choral music educators, Dr. Hightower teaches classes in undergraduate choral methods and conducting, in addition to maintaining a studio of four full-time master's degree students in choral conducting. In addition to his work at Sam Houston, Dr. Hightower is Music Director and Conductor of the Houston Masterworks Chorus, the city's largest independent chorus. Dr. Hightower's undergraduate work was done at Sam Houston. He studied conducting with Stephen Heyde and Donald Bailey at Baylor University. Graduate studies were also completed at Eastman School of Music and UCLA. Since returning to Texas in 2000, Dr. Hightower has guest-conducted the Houston Bach Choir and Orchestra, the Kentucky All-State Men's Choir, the TPSMEA All-State Choir, and honor choirs and orchestras in 12 Texas regions. Dr. Hightower recently served as Interim Minister of Music at Houston's First Baptist Church. Later this season, he will guest conduct the Houston Civic Symphony.

Christiaan Teeuwsen: The Regina Holmen Fryxell and Patricia Schad Leege Chapel Organist. A native of St. Catharines, Ontario, Canada, Christiaan received a Master of Fine Arts degree and Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Iowa. He also received the Solo Diploma [Uitvoerend Musicus] in organ performance from the Sweelinck Conservatory in Amsterdam. During his tenure in The Netherlands he studied with Harold Vogel and Ton Koopman and was associate organist to Klaas Bolt at the Grote of St. Bavo Kerk in Haarlem, Dr. Teeuwsen is currently Chair of Music the Music Department at Redeemer University in Ancaster, Ontario, where he also teaches Harpsichord, conducts the concert choir/alumni choir and teaches courses in choral music and performance practice. He has recorded for the Selemas label (Bach meets Buxtehude: Bader Organ/1641) and Magadis label (north-german organ works on a Schnitger Orgel/1702) and the Naxos label (The organ works of Georg Böhm: Reil Orgel/1999) and is currently working on The organ works of Vincent Lübeck -Naxos. He is also Director of Music at MacNab St. Presbyterian Church in Hamilton, Ontario, Canada.

Bruce Atwell, Horn, has performed throughout the United States and Europe as an orchestral musician and soloist. An Associate Professor of Music at the University of Wisconsin Oshkosh, Dr. Atwell maintains a busy teaching and performance schedule, with Principal Horn positions with the Milwaukee Ballet Orchestra, the Green Bay Symphony, the Fox Valley Symphony, and as a member of the Milwaukee Horn Quartet. He has performed with the Florida Symphony, the Hong Kong Philharmonic, as Acting Fourth Horn with the Philadelphia Orchestra, and with numerous orchestras throughout the United States.

Laurie Penpraze, trombone, is currently a member of the Florida West Coast Symphony in Sarasota, Florida. She is former Assistant Professor of Trombone at Miami University (OH) and was recently a Fulbright Scholar and Visiting Professor of Trombone at the Lithuanian Academy of Music in Vilnius, Lithuania. Laurie received her Bachelor of Music, Master of Music, and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees from the University of Michigan. Twice selected to participate in intensive seminars with world-renowned Swedish trombone soloist, Christian Lindberg, Laurie frequently performs as a soloist and chamber musician in this country and abroad as a member of Trio per Due with her husband Todd. This is Laurie's tenth summer at the Lutheran Summer Music Academy.

Polly Meyerding-Dedrick, *flute* Sarah Grudem, *harp* 

Polly Meyerding is a freelance flutist and flute instructor in Saint Paul, Minnesota. She has performed with numerous musical organizations in the Twin Cities area, including such diverse groups as the Minnesota Orchestra and the Monarch Trio, as well as in various international music festivals. She is the creator and director of the Summer Flute Fling and Flute Intensive, and is the President of the Upper Midwest Flute Association.

Sarah Grudem is a freelance harpist and teacher in the Twin Cities. She has played with many groups locally including the Valley Chamber Chorale, Thursday Musical, St. Paul Chamber Orchestra (through a University of MN collaboration) and the Duluth-Superior Symphony. As a competition winner in the American Harp Society's National competitions she has played in many major cities in the US, including Los Angeles, Seattle and Salt Lake City. Internationally Ms. Grudem has performed in Kristiansand, Norway at the Church Music Festival there, and in Prague at the World Harp Congress. She received her B.M. from Juilliard and her M.M. from the University of MN.

S. Blake Duncan is an adjunct faculty member in the Music Department at Bradley University teaching double reeds, music appreciation, and music technology. Additionally he is the director of both the Bradley Collegium Musicum and the Peoria Early Music Ensemble. Since 1995 he has served as oboe instructor, chair of the woodwind faculty, and as the Victor H. Mattfeld Director of the Collegium Musicum with the Lutheran Summer Music Program. He holds the Solo English horn chair with the Peoria Symphony Orchestra, is the solo oboist with the Peoria BachFest and performs with the Prairie Ensemble Chamber Orchestra as its principal oboist. In addition, he performs with the professional double reed quartet WiZARDS! which have completed four CDs. Mr. Duncan has appeared as a soloist with both the Peoria and Illinois Symphony Orchestras. An ordained ELCA pastor, he is currently the Director of Music, organist and choirmaster at St. Matthew's Episcopal Church in Bloomington. He also is Chorusmaster for both Sugar Creek Festival in Watseka, IL and Opera Illinois for whose fall 2005 production "HMS Pinafore" he served as both Music Director and Conductor.

Catherine McCord Larsen enjoys an active career as a soloist in performances of oratorio, baroque opera, and chamber music recitals. Recent apperances include Handel's "Messiah" with the Lyra Baroque Orchestra and Arvo Pärt's "Magnificat" with the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra. She is also a member of the voice faculty at Northwestern College in St. Paul, MN, where she teaches private lessons and class voice. Ms. McCord Larsen is a former member of the Dale Warland Singers, The Los Angeles Master Chorale, and I Cantori of Los Angeles with whom she toured under Columbia Artists Management. As a member of the Screen Actor's Guild, Ms. McCord Larsen has recorded several motion picture soundtracks, including scores by John Williams and James Newton Howard, as well as numerous national commercials to her credit.

**Todd Craven** is currently principal trumpet of the Florida West Coast Symphony and Florida Brass Quintet. A prizewinner in the Ellsworth Smith International Trumpet Competition, as well as First Prize winner of the International Trumpet Guild Solo Competition, Todd has performed with the New York Philharmonic and the Cincinnati Symphony. In addition, Todd has participated in summer festivals such as the National Repertory Orchestra, the Spoleto Festival Orchestra and the A.I.M.S. Festival Orchestra in Graz, Austria.

Todd received the Bachelor of Music degree from the University of Michigan under Armando Ghitalla and the Master of Music degree from Indiana University where he studied with Charles Gorham and Steven Burns. Todd performs in Trio per Due with his wife Laurie in Lithuania and Germany.

Canadian cellist **Andrea Lysack** has performed for audiences worldwide as soloist, chamber musician, and orchestral player. Former member of the Malaysian Philharmonic Orchestra in Kuala Lumpur and the Thunder Bay Symphony in Canada, Ms. Lysack is currently Assistant Principal Cello of the Windsor Symphony Orchestra.

In October 2005, Andrea and three of her colleagues launched the new Chamber Music Series of the WSO with a concert that included a performance of Bach's 'Goldberg' Variations in an arrangement for string trio. With the Schleswig-Holstein Musik Festival Orchestra under such conductors as Herbert Blomstedt, Esa-Pekka Salonen, Heinrich Schiff, and Christoph Eschenbach, Andrea performed in the major concert halls of Europe (Concertgebouw in Amsterdam, Rotterdam, Philharmonie Hall in St. Petersburg, Berlin, Helsinki, Tallinn, Riga, Hamburg, Lubeck, and Copenhagen). In May 2003, she toured southern Greece as a member of the Metropolitan String Quartet. Andrea was selected to perform in prestigious master classes given by Ralph Kirshbaum (London Master Classes at the Royal Academy of Music), Steven Isserlis (Prussia Cove-- Cornwall, UK), David Geringas (Kronberg Academy), Aldo Parisot (The Banff Centre for the Arts), and Janos Starker (Orford Arts Centre).

Ms. Lysack holds degrees from McGill University (Montreal) and the State University of New York at Stony Brook. Her musical mentors include Timothy Eddy, Antonio Lysy, Gil Kalish, and the late Julius Levine.

### Galina Zisk, piano

Dr. Zisk has performed throughout Russia, Ukraine, Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Austria, Italy, Canada and the U.S. as concerto soloist, chamber musician, and in solo recital.

Dr. Zisk is the Program Director of the Tchaikovsky Summer School in Cambridge, MA. She has served on the music faculties of Manhattan School of Music, Hartwick Summer Music Festival. Institute, and International School for Musical Arts and has collaborated with the Boys Choir of Harlem, Inc., Songs of Solomon Academy for the Arts, Christine Jowers' "Moving Arts Projects", Tchaikovsky Music Society, and The New Stage Theater. Her solo recitals have been broadcast on CJRT-FM radio in Canada as well as the *Bravol* TV channel, and her CD recording, Alexander Gedike's arrangement for Piano Trio of Tchaikovsky's *Seasons*, was released by Fidelis Records, Ltd. in 2002. Galina Zisk holds a Doctor of Musical Arts and Master of Music Degrees in Piano Performance from the Manhattan School of Music, and a Bachelor of Music Degree in Piano Performance from the University of Toronto.

He regularly performs with his sister in the "Ray and Amy Violin Duo" and is an active researcher having produced the first serious study of the Six Sonatas for solo violin of Eugène Ysaye.

Spencer received the Bachelor of Music degree cum laude from Butler University, the Master of Music degree from Wichita State University, and the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Minnesota. His principal teachers have included Korey Konkol and Catherine Consiglio.
