Philipp Melanchthon is commemorated today because of his connection with the Augsburg Confession. Colleague and co-reformer with Martin Luther, Melanchthor was a brilliant scholar, known as "the teacher of Germany."

Presentation of the Augsburg Confession, 1530. On this day in 1530 the German and Latin editions of the Augsburg Confession were presented to the Emperior Charles of the Holy Roman Empire. The Augsburg Confession was written by Philip Melanchthon and endorsed by Martin Luther, and consists of a brief summary of points in which the reformers saw their teaching as either agreeing with or differint from that of the Roman Catholic Church of the time.



Saint Cyril of Alexandria (ca. 378—ca. 444) was the Pope of Alexandria when the city was at its height of influence and power within the Roman Empire. Cyril wrote extensively and was a central figure in the First Council of Ephesus in 431; he is among the patristic fathers, and the Doctors of the Church, and his reputation within the Christian world has resulted in his titles "Pillar of Faith" and "Seal of all the Fathers."

TODAY'S LITURGY

Though all of the hymns which we sing in today's service come from one hymna reality our hymnal brings together music and texts from all over the globe and many different time periods. As we continue to reflect on our LSM worship theme. "Seeds of Faith, Fruits of Love," we remember that the seeds of inspiration we God plants in composers and hymn writers become the musical fruits which entry our worship lives. Here are a few notes on some of the hymns we will sing morning.

The opening hymn, *Holy God, We Praise Your Name*, features a text adapted the the *Te Deum*, a fourth-century hymn of praise often sung by monastic communities the conclusion of morning prayer services. The tune GROSSER GOTT comes from a 1744 Viennese hymnal, and is popular in the hymnals of many church denominate today.

Our hymn of the day uses a sixteenth-century German Lutheran chorale tune (SCHÖN LEUCHTET), often lovingly called "the queen of chorales." The text of the hymn (*O Holy Spirit, Enter In*) was translated into English in the nineteenth cent by Catherine Winkworth, whom the church remembers on July 1.

Our Offertory song (*Take My Life, That I May Be*) combines a nineteenth-cent devotional text with a new South-American flavored melody written by Willie Dexheimer Pharris, a resident of Minneapolis.

Finally, you may notice that the Communion hymn, *Glorious Things of You A* Spoken, reminds you of today's psalm—that's because the text is a paraphrase Psalm 87 by John Newton, the same man who wrote *Amazing Grace*. The t (BLAENWERN) is by a Welsh composer, William Rowlands.


