

SUNDAY, JULY 13, 2008 Ninth Sunday After Pentecost

Today's Liturgy

God's word is like the rain that waters the earth and brings forth vegetation. It is also like the sower who scatters seed indiscriminately. Our lives are like seeds sown in the earth. Even from what appears to be little, dormant, or dead, God promises a harvest. At the Lord's table we are fed with the bread of life, that we may bear fruit in the world.

The Bach Cantata: Erschallet, ihr Lieder, erklinget, ihr Saiten! (BWV 172)

In spring of 1714 (ten years before beginning his work at Leipzig), Johann Sebastian Bach was promoted to the title of *Konzertmeister* to the court at Weimar, where he would be responsible for the composition of a monthly cantata and other concerted works. Even though Bach composed hundreds of cantatas, our cantata this morning, *Erschallet Ihr Lieder, erklinget Ihr Saiten!* is one of his earliest and represents some amazing experimentation.

The cantata was composed for Pentecost Sunday, one of the most celebrated holidays in the Lutheran church at that time (rivaled only by Easter and Christmas), which merited a festival setting with trumpets and timpani—a relatively rare but fantastic addition. Bach must have liked this composition as he repeated it four more times in his life, and even transposed it for the different tuning system used in Leipzig.

The opening chorus immediately presents a festive mood with trumpets, timpani, and strings in a flurry of fanfare calls, echoed soon thereafter by the choir. Following this joyful opening, however, is an intimate recitative for bass and continuo group, speaking of "making a dwelling" with God in the heart. This leads directly into a second—and equally confident—fanfare in the form of an aria for bass, continuo, trumpets and timpani (the only one of its kind that I have heard in a cantata). The fourth movement (and centerpiece of the cantata when the first movement is repeated), persuades the "paradise of the soul" to prepare for the Spirit of God as it approaches—all of the violins and violas play a weaving, transparent melody portraying this gentle wafting. Following this gentle aria comes one of Bach's 'love' duets between the soul and the Holy Spirit in a complex musical dialogue between the voices, continuo group and obbligato oboe. The final chorale melody would be somewhat familiar to modern ears, but Bach obscures it by setting a violin descant above the tune (perhaps the Holy Spirit wafting above?)—a move rarely repeated in the hundreds of cantatas he would later compose. In the original Weimar parts, a command to repeat the first movement appears (this was dropped in later performances), and reignites the energy and fire of that festival day.
