TODAY'S SERVICE

The readings for this morning challenge us to put flesh and bones on our faith in Christ. St. Paul writes in Colossians that those who "share in the inheritance of the saints" are to "bear fruit in every good work." In the Gospel Reading Jesus points to the law when the lawyer asks him about eternal life: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." The word is very near to us, we read in Deuteronomy; it is in our mouths and in our hearts to observe.

Indeed, the living Word is written on our hearts and in our mouths this day in the person of Jesus. It is in him, and because of his saving work with the Father and the Holy Spirit, that we are empowered to observe the law in acts of mercy and compassion, giving thanks to God "with hearts and hands and voices."

ABOUT THE CANTATA

In 1725, as his second year in Leipzig was nearing its end, J. S. Bach composed today's cantata for Reformation Sunday on October 31 of that year. Comparing this work with his other extant cantatas, it seems actually rather small, running about fifteen minutes in length. Bach makes up for this rather brief length in contrapuntal genius, orchestration, and expressive power.

From the opening measures of this work, you will hear the strength and scope of Bach's realization of the text, "God the Lord is sun and shield," with mighty horncalls, warlike drums, and fanfare motives of the strings and winds. Immediately following this grand start, a double fugue begins with a measure of repeated pitches and a flourish of sixteenths that Bach will later augment into the choir's fugue subject to the text "er wird kein Gutes mangeln den lassen Frommen" ("he will allow no good thing to be lacking to the righteous"). It is as though this amazing promise from the Psalms is being shouted to every nation!

In contrast, the second movement is a joyful pastorale for flute (a revision in 1730 from the original part written for oboe), mezzo, and basso continuo (organ, cello, and bass). One can hear the ease and comfort in the heart of the faithful (one of his "little flock") despite the approaching enemies.

Perhaps the most famous movement of this cantata is a scintillating hybrid of the well-known chorale, Nun danket alle Gott (which we will sing) and the amazing horn parts from the opening movement. This is a tour-de-force for the horns (you will hear the equivalent of high Cs time and time again), with almost no time to rest let alone breathe. This is piece not only of amazing strength, but one that calls us to actively thank God with "heart, mouth, and hands."

The recitative to follow is the crux of the piece: that it is through Jesus that all this can be done. Near the end of the movement, you will hear the word "Mittler" (mediator) set to one of Bach's famous cross motives (one can draw lines between the first and fourth note, and again the second and third note, forming a cross laid on its side). Additionally, the harmony chosen for that measure includes three sharps (the German word for sharp is Kreuz which can also be be translated as Cross).

A soprano and bass duet follows with an unusual orchestration: basso continuo and an obbligato of the entire violin section. The leaps and repeated notes of the strings portray these 'raging enemies' surrounding us—perhaps why the soloists continue to return to their close parallel lines.

The cantata ends with a prayer for truth and the freedom to praise God through Jesus Christ, with all of the forces combined on the chorale except for the horns and timpani which provide elegant and soaring counterpoint above the tune (a rare occurrence in Bach's cantata output). This 'halo' of melody seems to introduce the Holy Spirit keeping watch over the people of God in prayer and praise, and draws all of the drama of this cantata to a majestic close.





Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.


Therefore, gracious Father, with this bread and cup we remember the life our Lord offered for us.







SING WITH ALL the SAINTS in GLORY



Martin Luther (1483 - 1546) was a theologian, preacher, musician, and hymn writer, and is considered the primary catalyst for the Reformation. Though Luther was a priest and Augustinian monk, his efforts to challenge questionable teachings in the Church – including the nature of justification and the selling of indulgences – led to his excommunication by Pope Leo X. This, in turn, led to the founding of what is now known as Lutheranism. Luther translated the Bible from Latin into German (the language of his people), wrote many didactic hymns to teach the tenets of the Christian faith, and composed hymn tunes that drew

upon German folk idioms as well as Renaissance compositional techniques. Today's sung creed, We All Believe in One True God (WIR GLAUBEN ALL), and the Sanctus hymn, Isaiah in a Vision Did of Old (JESAIA, DEM PROPHETEN), are two examples of Luther's contributions to the corpus of sacred music.





Dietrich Buxtehude (ca. 1637 – 1707) was a Lutheran cantor and a leading composer of the mid-Baroque era in Northern Europe. During his years at the Mariankirche in Lübeck, he became so well-known that younger composers like George Frederic Handel and Johann Sebastian Bach traveled to Lübeck to meet him and hear him play. He continued and strengthened a tradition of evening concerts at the Mariankirche known as *Abendmusik* (from which our LSM *Abendmusik* takes its name). Like many other Lutheran cantors of the Baroque era, Buxtehude wrote cantatas, motets and organ works, many of which were based

upon or incorporated the melodies and/or texts of Lutheran chorales (as demonstrated by the two settings of NUN LOB, MEIN' SEEL' that frame one of the chorales during Communion this morning).





Johann Sebastian Bach (1685 – 1750) is upheld as the archetypal Lutheran cantor and, with George Frideric Handel, is recognized as one of the two most significant composers of the Baroque; the year of his death is often considered to be the "end" of that era in the history of music. Bach is credited as the perfecter of many of the musical duties of the Lutheran church musician. His mastery of the musical forms of his day, his expansion of contrapuntal compositional techniques, and his ability to preach the Gospel through music – including his Passions, cantatas, and numerous smaller works – is exemplar of the cantor's art; yet he inscribed his scores with the Latin phrase *Soli Deo Gloria*: "To God alone the glory."
