He has also worked as a poloist with conductor Helmuth Rilling and Metropolitan Opera soprano Marlis Peterson. Todel currently teaches trumpet and directs the Philharmonia Orchestra at St. Olaf college.

aul Morton serves as associate professor of trumpet and jazz studies at the University f Louisiana at Lafayette. In Lafayette he performs with the Acadiana Symphony, the Louisiana Brass Quintet, and the UL Lafayette Faculty Jazz Combo. He regularly performs and presents master classes across the United States. In 2009-2010 he traveled Alabama, North Carolina, and Wisconsin. Recent international engagements have included performances in Russia, Belgium, Hong Kong, Canada, and at the 2009 International Trumpet Guild Conference. Morton has been on the LSM faculty since 1996.

orchestral musician and soloist. A professor of music at the University of Wisconsin Oshkosh, Atwell maintains a busy teaching and performance schedule, with principal orn positions with the Milwaukee Ballet Orchestra, the Green Bay Symphony, the Fox alley Symphony, and as a member of the Milwaukee Horn Quartet. He has performed with the Florida Symphony, the Hong Kong Philharmonic, as acting fourth horn with the Philadelphia Orchestra, and with numerous orchestras throughout the United States.

rombonist Laurie Penpraze is currently a member of the Sarasota Orchestra. Formerly, she was assistant professor of trombone at Miami University and a Fulbright Scholar and visiting professor at the Lithuanian Academy of Music. Penpraze has been cognized in solo competitions, including the International Trombone Competition in izhny-Novgorod and the American Waterways International Trombone Competition. She frequently performs in Europe as a member of Trio per Due with her husband, tumpeter Todd Craven. In the summer of 2009, she performed concerts in Finland, ermany, and Lithuania with organist Jurate Landsbergyte. Penpraze received her tegrees from the University of Michigan.

Pr. John Bottomley recently joined the faculty of University of Massachusetts-Amherst, aving previously taught at Kent State University, Miami University (Ohio), and Wright State University. Bottomley also maintains an active performing career as an orchestral and chamber musician and has performed with such groups as the Cincinnati Symphony and Pops Orchestra, Milwaukee Symphony, West Virginia Symphony, Cincinnati Opera and Ballet Orchestras, and the Key West Symphony Orchestra. Bottomley received his D.M.A. from The Ohio State University and holds an M.M. from the Manhattan School of Music.

He leads a steel drum quintet, and works as a freelance musician. Bernier is a doctoral candidate at the University of Iowa where he directs various ensembles and teaches applied lessons. He holds degrees from the University of Iowa and Minnesota State University Moorhead and has studied with Dan Moore, Kenyon Williams, Allen Carter, and Jim Dreier. Bernier endorses Innovative Percussion sticks and mallets.

Dr. James L. Brown enjoys an eclectic career of singing, teaching, operatic stage directing, and conducting. Brown is the chair of vocal studies at Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma, WA. Recent activities have included staging HMS Pinafore with Lakewood Playhouse and Verdi's Don Carlo for Bellevue Opera in Washington State. Upcoming performances include conductor and stage director of Il Barbiere di Siviglia for Vashon Opera, singing in Monteverdi's Vespers of 1610 with Pacific Musicworks (Stephen Stubbs, director) and singing Vecchi's L'amfiparnasso with the Seattle Early Music Guild. James holds degrees from Loyola University New Orleans, The Juilliard School, and the State University of New York at Stony Brook.

Catherine McCord Larsen, soprano, is an active soloist in performances of oratorio, baroque opera, chamber music and contemporary avant garde. She is on the voice faculty at Northwestern College in St. Paul, Minnesota and is a former member of the Dale Warland Singers and Los Angeles Master Chorale. As a member of the Screen Actors Guild, McCord Larsen has recorded several motion picture soundtracks and national commercials. This is her seventh season with LSM.

Cheryl Lemmons, piano, is from Snyder, TX, and is the staff accompanist at Abilene Christian University from which she received a B.M.Ed. She holds an M.M. in piano performance from Hardin-Simmons University. Her former teachers include Lynn Bethe Baldwin, Ronald Rathbun, and Dan McAlexander, and she has also studied with Harold Heiberg at the University of North Texas. She has participated in master classes and workshops with John Wustmann, Martin Katz, Seymour Bernstein, and Graham Johnson.

Samuel Nordlund, cellist, is an active performer and teacher in the Chicago area. A regular member of the Illinois Philharmonic and Northwest Indiana Symphony Orchestra, he is also a substitute player with the Chicago and Milwaukee Symphonies. Nordlund is an active chamber musician and coach, and has coached chamber music and orchestra for the Chicago Youth Symphonies and the Music Institute of Chicago Academy. While earning a B.M. at the University of Alabama and an M.M. from Northwestern University, he completed additional studies at Music Academy of the West, Tanglewood, and the Meadowmount School of Music.

Dr. Michael Scarbrough is professor of voice at Abilene Christian University where he teaches vocal pedagogy, private voice, and is conductor for Opera Workshop. He holds degrees from McMurry University, Scarritt College and Arizona State University. His students are accepted into such graduate programs as Cincinnati Conservatory, Florida State University, and Boston Conservatory and are singing professionally. In addition, he works with several professional singers in an advisory capacity. He is active in the National Association of Teachers of Singing and has served as an officer at the chapter and regional levels, and serves as the singing specialist for the Voice Institute of West Texas. This is his third year teaching at LSM.

Award-winning harpsichordist and pianist Dr. Gabriel Shuford has performed with a liverse range of ensembles including the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center, the rehestra of St. Luke's and Speculum Musicae. Ongoing collaborations include work with violinist Kathleen Kajioka, double bassist Nicholas Walker, and recorder player Paul Leenhouts. Shuford pursues a varied musical life ranging from the bluegrass and op influences of Stolen Shack, featured on NPR, to the free improvisations of Jupiter extant, his latest project with saxophonist Lars Jacobsen. He holds degrees from Lawrence University and Stony Brook University where he earned his doctorate in larpsichord.

Dr. Kerry Walters is associate professor of music at Bradley University in Peoria, Illinois where she chairs the voice area, directs the Women's Choir and Opera Workshop, and teaches diction and vocal pedagogy and literature. She is a frequent concert singer in the Central Illinois region and especially enjoys performing the Baroque repertory. Recent solo performances include St. Matthew Passion with the Peoria Bach Festival in June and Girls' Night Out: The Music of Clara Schumann and Cécile Chaminade, a series of performances with LSM piano faculty member Denise Parr-Scanlin. She holds a D.M.A. from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music.

Dr. Andrew D. Whitfield, baritone, enjoys a dynamic career as a performer, teacher, and tage director. In addition to appearances with Des Moines Metro Opera, Opera outhwest, and Pensacola Opera, Whitfield was also a resident artist with Portland Opera Works. His most recent performance highlights include engagements with the Peoria Bach Festival, the Dubuque Symphony Orchestra, and Cedar Rapids Opera Theatre. Priginally from Indiana, Whitfield is a graduate of Butler University, Wichita State University, and Louisiana State University. He currently serves as assistant professor of music (voice and opera) at Luther College. 2010 is his fifth summer at LSM.

Karen Wilkerson is active as a professional singer, conductor, and teacher, and resides n the Twin Cities of Minnesota. She currently sings with the Ensemble Singers of VocalEssence, Minneapolis, Minnesota. Wilkerson is in her 17th year as director of adult choirs at Saint Michael's Lutheran Church, Roseville, Minnesota. She teaches voice on he music faculty of St. Olaf College. She sang and recorded for four years in the Dale Warland Singers, and has sung in over 14 productions with the Minnesota Opera. Wilkerson is an active recitalist, most recently performing in Minneapolis, Virginia, and California. She holds degrees in Music from California State University, Northridge, and Westminster Choir College, Princeton, New Jersey. This summer marks her 13th year eaching for LSM.

Dr. Heather Armstrong is assistant professor of oboe and theory at Luther College. She plays principal oboe with the Waterloo-Cedar Falls Symphony, is a member of the Talus Trio, and performs at the Cedar Valley Chamber Music Festival during the summer. Armstrong received her D.M.A and M.M. degrees from the Eastman School of Music, where she studied with Richard Killmer. She received her B.M. degree from Houghton College. Armstrong has also studied at the Banff Centre and the Chautauqua Institution. Before moving to Iowa she held teaching positions at Houghton College and the Hochstein School of Music and Dance.

Dr. Lori Baruth was appointed assistant professor of clarinet at Morehead State University in Morehead, Kentucky in 2007. She received her D.M.A. from the College-Conservatory of Music at the University of Cincinnati (2010), her M.M. (2004) and both the B.M. and B.M.E. from The Ohio State University (1999). Her teachers have included Richie Hawley, Steve Cohen, James Pyne, and Dr. Donald McGinnis. Baruth has performed with the Huntington (WV), Westerville (OH), and the Central Ohio Symphony Orchestras, the Heisey Wind Ensemble, and the Opera Theater and Music Festival of Lucca Orchestra of Lucca, Italy. She is also active as a chamber musician, recitalist, and adjudicator throughout the Midwest.

Dr. Bruce Atwell, horn, has performed throughout the United States and Europe as an orchestral musician and soloist. A professor of music at the University of Wisconsin Oshkosh, Atwell maintains a busy teaching and performance schedule, with principal horn positions with the Milwaukee Ballet Orchestra, the Green Bay Symphony, the Fox Valley Symphony, and as a member of the Milwaukee Horn Quartet. He has performed with the Florida Symphony, the Hong Kong Philharmonic, as acting fourth horn with the Philadelphia Orchestra, and with numerous orchestras throughout the United States.

Dr. David Oyen is associate professor of music at Morehead State University. He studied bassoon with Robert Wisneskey, Gary Echols, Günter Pfitzenmaier, Stephan Krings and Christopher Weait. He has performed with the Springfield (OH) Symphony Orchestra, the Columbus (OH) Symphony Orchestra, the Lexington Philharmonic, the West Virginia Symphony, the Seneca Chamber Orchestra, the Huntington Symphony Orchestra (WV) and the Baird Winds. Oyen has performed at International Double Reed Society Conferences in 1997, 2001, 2003, and 2005. He is president-elect of the Kentucky Music Teachers Association (state Music Teachers National Association affiliate) and will become president of that organization in October 2010.
