TODAY'S SERVICE

The revelation of God is at the center of today's readings. When the Lord appeared to Abraham in Genesis 18 he appeared in the form of three men, delivering news that Sarah would bear a son. When God revealed himself in the person of Jesus, St. Paul writes in Colossians, "the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things." In the Gospel Reading Jesus reveals God's will for all who follow him through the example of Mary and Martha.

God is revealed among us today through the Word proclaimed in sacramental bread and wine. As we go forth from this month-long experience at Lutheran Summer Music, we go in the knowledge that Christ dwells in us. As God's living saints, the hope of his glory is now revealed in our daily lives.

Therefore, gracious Father, with this bread and cup we remember the life our Lord offered for us.


And, believing the witness of his resurrection, we await his coming in power to share with us the great and promised feast.




COMMUNION


