



Herbert F. Brokering (1926–2009), author of Saturday evening's hymn *Alleluial Jesus Is Risen*, was a hymn-writer, author, pastor and speaker. He wrote over thirty books and more than one hundred texts for hymns and choral works, collaborating with Dave

Brubeck, Carl Schalk, Ronald A. Nelson, David N. Johnson, and many other composers. As a pastor he served parishes in Pittsburgh, Long Island (NY), and San Antonio. Through his lifetime, he was concerned with issues of peace, justice, and healing. An endowment fund at Wartburg College, his alma mater, supports the practice of the "healing arts," including music.



Paul Manz (1919–2009), composer of Saturday evening's setting of *Psalm 130*, was an internationally-known organist, composer, and Lutheran church musician. He is credited as a primary influence in the twentieth-century American revival of the liturgical use of the organ, and as the "inventor" of the modern hymn

festival. He served Mt. Olive Lutheran Church in Minneapolis, the Evangelical Lutheran Church of St. Luke in Chicago, and Christ Seminary-Seminex. He received numerous awards and honors during his lifetime which recognized his contributions to the Church, both as a musician and a confessor of the faith.



Dale Wood (1934–2003), composer of the setting of the *Magnificat*, received his first recognition as a composer when (at the age of 13) he won a national hymn-writing contest sponsored by the American Lutheran Church. He was both a composer and editor of music, serving the Choristers Guild and the Sacred

Music Press in editorial roles. He served as cantor for Episcopal and Lutheran congregations in California and frequently wrote and spoke about issues in church music. His textbook *Hemidemisemiquavers...and Other Such Things* was considered an important reference guide to music notation.
