TODAY'S SERVICE

It is an age-old question: why is there evil in the world? In the parable of the wheat and the weeds Jesus suggests that both grow together until the harvest. With Paul, we long for the day that all creation will be set free from bondage and suffering. Having both weeds and wheat within us, we humbly place our hope in the promises of God, and from the Lord's table we go forth to bear the fruit of justice and mercy.

TODAY'S CANTATA

Cantata 190, *Singet dem Herrn ein neues Lied!*, was composed for January 1, 1724, Bach's first New Year's Day in Leipzig. The opening text, "Sing to the Lord a new song" is clearly appropriate as a new song to be sung in a new year.

The brilliant opening chorus of the cantata utilizes a large orchestra composed of five groups of instruments: choir, strings, oboes and bassoon, trumpets and timpani, and the continuo. This style of composition with competing groups of instruments was the contemporary approach to composition in Bach's day, known as concertato style. Thus Bach composed in a new style for a new year.

In the midst of the opening movement, surrounded by contrapuntal busyness, the chorus sings a unison chorale. This chorale is the Te Deum that was sung in the church of Bach's time. Originally a Gregorian chant, Bach places this ancient melody of worship in the heart of the movement, thus maintaining the tradition of the old style. Then Bach adds to that ancient form a new song in the modern concertato style: truly, through the Church, the song goes on.

Bach further intensifies the excitement of the opening movement by employing a fugue to express the text *Alles was Odem hat lobt den Herrn*, "all that hath life and breath, praise the Lord." Just as the Gospel of Christ is spread from one person to another, Bach passes the text from one voice to another. A final return to the concertato style celebrates an exuberant Alleluia.

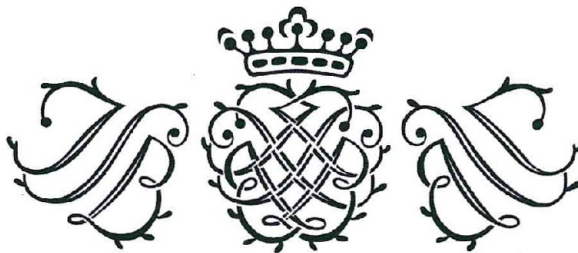
The second movement sets the Te Deum as a four-voice chorale, interspersed with recitatives expounding on the chorale text. The third movement is an aria for alto and string orchestra. This minuet is permeated with a dotted rhythm associated with joy.

The fourth movement, a *secco* recitative for bass and continuo, begins in free rhythm. The text expresses the desire for Jesus' presence throughout the year ahead. As the movement comes to a close, the rhythm becomes steady, with the continuo following the voice of the soloist, just as the Christian follows Jesus.

The fifth movement, a joyful dance, is a duet for tenor and bass, with continuo and obbligato oboe d'amore. Every phrase of text begins with the name "Jesus," expressing the believer's love for the Savior. The tenor then sings an *accompagnato* recitative in which the text pleads for blessings in the New Year. The recitative closes with the text *So leben wir dies ganze Jahr im Segen*, "we will live throughout the year in Jesus' blessing."

The final chorale brings back the full choral and orchestral forces, with the trumpets and timpani playing a festive fanfare at the end of every choral phrase: the goal of each New Year is to always praise the name of Jesus.




