Program Notes

Our fanfare tonight is John Moss' arrangement of *Olympic Fanfare and Theme* by John Williams, from the 1984 Olympic Summer Games in Los Angeles. With this fanfare, we are honoring the upcoming Olympics in London, as well as the 80th birthday of composer John Williams.

Symphony No. 1: The Lord of the Rings

A native of the Netherlands, Johan de Meij studied band conducting and trombone at the Royal Conservatory in the Hague. He has earned an international reputation as a composer, and as an arranger of popular and classical music. Mr. de Meij's first symphony is based on the J. R. R. Tolkien (1892-1973) trilogy, *The Lord of the Rings*, first published in 1955. Each of the five movements illustrates an important character or episode from the literature. The symphony was awarded first prize in the 1989 Sudler International Wind Band Composition Competition. Our performance tonight celebrates the 25th anniversary of the work. We are honored to have LSM Chaplain Wayne Weissenbuehler provide commentary preceding each movement.

On March 2, 2013, Maestro de Meij will conduct the symphony at Valparaiso University to celebrate the 25th anniversary of its premiere. The performance will feature the combined Valparaiso University Chamber Concert Band and Windiana Concert Band, and will be the headline event of *Celebrating The Hobbit: A Conference on the Works of J. R. R. Tolkien*.

God of Our Fathers

Lyricist Daniel Roberts wrote the text of *God of Our Fathers* to celebrate the centennial of the Declaration of Independence. George Warren set the text to his tune, *National Hymn*, to commemorate the centennial of the United States Constitution. Claude T. Smith was one of America's finest and most prolific band composers. He also taught music in the public schools and at the university level, mostly in Missouri. Please sing with us!

Scherzo for Horn and Concert Band

Charles Fernandez in an Emmy-nominated composer who has written music for the Disney television series *The Little Mermaid*, 101 Dalmatians, and Doug, as well as the *Casper* cartoon series of Universal. His music is also featured in many films including Aladdin III, All Dogs Go to Heaven, and Tom Sawyer.

Scherzo was composed for and premiered by Jennifer Bliman and the Los Angeles Pierce Symphonic Winds. It demonstrates both lyrical and articulated qualities of the horn. It is a great honor to present long-time LSM faculty member Dr. Bruce Atwell as our soloist. The primary goal of featuring a guest faculty artist is to give our students the experience of preparing the accompaniment for a professional soloist.

Alchemy

Dr. Andrew Boysen, Jr. serves as director of bands at the University of New Hampshire. He earned a B.M. in composition and music education at the University of Iowa, an M.M. in wind conducting at Northwestern University, and a D.M.A. in wind conducting at the Eastman School of Music. *Alchemy* was commissioned by the Indiana Bandmasters Association for the 2008 All-District High School Honor Bands, and was premiered at eight sites during the honor band festival weekend. I had the privilege of conducting the premiere at North Judson San Pierre High School.

Metallic percussion sounds and mysterious chorale-like wind harmonies seem to describe the alchemist's laboratory. As the work progresses, the tempo and energy increase, including rhythms juxtaposed three against four, perhaps suggesting success in changing baser elements into gold.

Ride

Samuel Hazo is a graduate of Duquesne University and has been a music teacher at every grade level from kindergarten through college. In 2003, he became the first composer in history to be named winner of both composition contests sponsored by the National Band Association. Mr. Hazo has composed for the professional, university, and public school levels, in addition to writing original scores for television, radio, and the stage. *Ride* was composed to honor Mr. Hazo's mentor, Dr. Jack Stamp, director of bands at Indiana University of Pennsylvania, and conductor of the Keystone Winds professional concert band. It describes a wild automobile ride where Dr. Stamp was driving top speed on the country roads of Pennsylvania.

Abendmusik

Our Abendmusik is a beautiful setting of *Jesus Loves Me* (ELW 595, LSB 588) by David Holsinger. Dr. Holsinger is an award-winning composer who teaches at Lee University in Tennessee. His works range from extremely complicated (like *In the Spring at the Time When Kings Go Off to War*, performed by the LSM Concert Band in 2011), to pieces for young bands, to a series of hymn songs for band. He is one of the most popular band composers of the last 25 years.

Guest Artists

Dr. Bruce Atwell, horn, has performed throughout the United States and Europe as an orchestral musician and soloist. An associate professor of music at the University of Wisconsin Oshkosh, Dr. Atwell maintains a busy teaching and performance schedule, with principal horn positions with the Milwaukee Ballet Orchestra, Green Bay Symphony, Fox Valley Symphony, and as a member of the Milwaukee Horn Quartet. He has performed with the Florida Symphony, Hong Kong Philharmonic, as acting fourth horn with the Philadelphia Orchestra, and with numerous orchestras throughout the United States.

Rev. Wayne Weissenbuehler, the 2012 Phyllis and Richard Duesenberg Endowed Chaplain Chair, serves as pastor of Faith Lutheran Church in Burlington, Iowa. He is a retired pastor and bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). This past year, Chaplain Wayne taught a course in ethics at Southeastern Community College in West Burlington, Iowa. After LSM this summer he will be chaplain for the Burlington Bees, the Class A minor league baseball team affiliated with the Oakland Athletics. Pastor Weissenbuehler and his wife, Pastor Susanne Smith, both serve congregations of the ELCA in Burlington and are fast becoming acclimated to Iowa living on the Mississippi River.

LSM Festival Concert Band Conductor

Dr. Jeffrey Scott Doebler serves as professor of music and director of music education and bands at Valparaiso University, where he also conducted the handbell choir for many years. His previous experience includes public school teaching in Emmetsburg, Iowa, and Shakopee, Minnesota. He is equally effective when working with younger students, older students, and professional musicians. Dr. Doebler earned music education degrees from Luther College (B.A.), Valparaiso University (M.M.), and the University of Minnesota (Ph.D.). He has served Lutheran Summer Music as concert band conductor, handbell choir conductor (founder), summer program director, and faculty affairs coordinator.

Dr. Doebler's career of 30 years in music education has achieved a unique balance of conducting, teacher preparation, leadership in the profession, and working with musicians from beginning through professional levels, but all aspects of his vocation have had an ultimate focus on teaching. Dr. Doebler has been recognized for teaching excellence by peers, colleagues, and students. During the sesquicentennial year of Valparaiso University, he was named one of the 150 most influential people in VU's first 150 years. Dr. Doebler is a recipient of the Carlo A. Sperati Award from Luther College for outstanding achievement in the field of music. He was named Outstanding University Music Educator of the Year by the Indiana Music Educators Association, and also received the Chicagoland Outstanding Music Educator Award from Quinlan & Fabish Music. Dr. Doebler is the 2005 recipient of the Valparaiso University Alumni Association Distinguished Teaching Award. He has been honored by Sigma Alpha lota with its national award, Friend of the Arts, and Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia recognized him with the Orpheus Award "for significant and lasting contributions to the cause of music in America."

Dr. Doebler is active throughout the year as a guest conductor, consultant, and clinician, and has appeared professionally in over 25 states, Canada, Malta, Australia, New Zealand, and China. In a typical year, Dr. Doebler works with over 3,000 students. He has served as a community music conductor, church music director, and director of Royal Brass Ensembles for the Minnesota Renaissance Festival. As a high school teacher, Dr. Doebler earned a reputation for leading the transformation of struggling bands into model programs. He was also active in site-based management and district-wide strategic planning. At the university level, his interpretations, repertoire selection, conducting, and leadership have been highly praised. Dr. Doebler has conducted in many famous venues around the world, including the Sydney Opera House (Australia), Severance Hall (Cleveland), and the Oriental Performance Hall (Shanghai).

Dr. Doebler is a former president of the Indiana Music Educators Association, and currently serves as state editor. He is president-elect of the Indiana Bandmasters Association (IBA). For the IBA, he regularly conducts the All-Region and All-District Honor Bands. He conducted the All-State Band in 2011 and he will conduct the Junior All-State Band in 2014. Dr. Doebler is founder and conductor of a professional-level concert band, Windiana, which has completed seven concert tours of China, performing live and on television for millions of people.
