He was on faculty at Tulane, University of Nebraska Omaha, Southeastern Louisiana University, and the University of Louisiana-Lafayette. Carbonara currently freelances, is a bass coach for Greater Twin Cities Youth Symphonies, runs two string programs with his violinist wife, and maintains a private studio.

Catherine Rodland, whose playing has been described as "transcendent" (*The American Organist*), is artist in residence at St. Olaf College. She received her B.M. from St. Olaf College, and her M.M. and D.M.A. from Eastman School of Music where she was a student of Russell Saunders. At Eastman, Rodland received the prestigious Performer's Certificate and the Ann Anway Award for excellence in organ performance. She is a prizewinner in several competitions including the 1994 and 1998 American Guild of Organists Young Artists Competitions and maintains an active career as a recitalist.
