PROGRAM NOTES

Our fanfare tonight, Fanfare for Ten-Year-Olds (1988), was composed by John Williams. It was premiered by the Charleston Symphony, in honor of the ten-year anniversary of the Charleston Stage (formerly The Young Charleston Theater Company).

Luminescence

Luminescence was composed for the 2009 National Band Festival of the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod. The work is based on fragments of the hymn *Break Forth, O Beauteous Heavenly Light*, used by J. S. Bach in the *Christmas Oratorio*. Please sing the chorale with us before we hear *Luminescence*.

David Biedenbender is an acclaimed composer who teaches at Boise State University. He earned the D.M.A. degree in composition from the University of Michigan.

Cape Breton Postcard

We are truly honored to have Catherine McMichael attending our concert tonight! She is an accomplished composer with a wide variety of music, including solo works, chamber music, handbell choir music, and compositions for band, choir, and orchestra. She also has ties to Lutheran Summer Music, as her son, Nathan Bieber, attended LSM in 2013.

Cape Breton is in Nova Scotia, Canada, with a strong Scottish heritage. The work is based on the melody heard in the second movement: a fiddle song by Canadian composer Wilfred Gillis, entitled *Arisaig Mist*.

We Will Stand Together

In 2013, we heard the LSM Symphony Orchestra, conducted by David Upham, perform the exciting *Enigma Variations* by Edward Elgar. The title of the ninth variation is *Nimrod*, and it has an especially beautiful melody. On June 1, 2014, a new professional concert band debuted in Washington, D.C. WindWorks of Washington is conducted by Russell Gross, former member of the U.S. Navy Band. Maestro Gross commissioned Scott Silbert to arrange *We Will Stand Together* to be premiered at that inaugural performance. I am grateful that Mr. Gross has loaned us the arrangement. It is a great honor to have LSM voice faculty members Penny and George Hogan to sing with us.

Enchanted Spaces

The Decorah High School Band, under the direction of James Fritz, commissioned and premiered *Enchanted Spaces*, in honor of beautiful area in and around Decorah. Samuel Hazo is a graduate of Duquesne University and has been a music teacher at every grade level from kindergarten through college. In 2003, he became the first person to be named winner of both composition contests sponsored by the National Band Association. Mr. Hazo has composed for the professional, university and public school levels, in addition to writing original scores for television, radio, and the stage.

French Quarter Fantasy

Graham Breedlove is a highly-acclaimed trumpeter and composer who plays in the US Army Blues, the jazz ensemble of the U.S. Army Band, "Pershing's Own." He is a native of Lafayette, LA, home of University of Louisiana-Lafayette, and LSM trumpet and jazz band instructor Paul Morton. Dr. Morton and I are grateful that Mr. Breedlove is allowing us to perform his music at LSM, then again on tour in China with Windiana Concert Band during December and January.

French Quarter Fantasy is in the style of New Orleans Dixieland Jazz. You'll hear Dr. Morton improvise and play happy and melancholy melodies. You'll hear the band join him on some of the melodies, as well as collective improvisation from the trumpet section and many other members of the band.

The Invincible Eagle

The Invincible Eagle is one of several marches that Mr. Sousa composed in honor of the Sousa Band's engagement at an important exposition, this one being the 1901 Pan American Exposition in Buffalo, NY. In its day, the Sousa Band was like today's rock stars, filling concert halls around the world. If the Sousa Band performed for a festival or other exposition, that venue would surely turn a profit.

Private Eye Prowl

Private Eye Prowl is a change-of-pace selection for the program tonight. It's written in a fun and jazzy style that reflects the title. It also calls for audience participation. On three occasions, all of us on stage, plus all of you will need to say "shhhhh." I'll cue you. It's important that you all say "shhhhh" with great enthusiasm, so that villain doesn't catch us.

I had the honor of conducting the premiere of *Private Eye Prowl* on January 25, 2014, with the Indiana Junior All-State Band. The composition was commissioned by the Indiana Bandmasters Association (IBA). Since 1988, IBA has been commissioning important composers to write music that is premiered by our honor bands. Many of these works have become part of the standard repertoire.

Composer Jesse Ayers came to LSM in 2011, when the LSM Band and I, with mezzo-soprano Beth Ray Westlund, premiered the Biblical music drama, *Rahab* is a finalist for the American Prize. Dr. Ayers teaches at Malone University in Ohio.

Festival Procession of the Knights of St. John

Our final selection, Festival Procession of the Knights of St. John, is one that sounds terrific in the Center for Faith and Life, especially with Gregory Peterson joining us on organ. The work may remind you of Elsa's Procession to the Cathedral by Richard Wagner or Russian Christmas Music by Alfred Reed.

The composition also connects Malta, Luther College, and Valparaiso University. The Knights of St. John—originally hospitaliers, then later invincible soldiers—settled on the Mediterranean archipelago of Malta, which was the location of St. Paul's shipwreck (Acts 28). The Valparaiso University Chamber Concert Band has toured Malta on three occasions, including 2014, where we played a private concert for the president of Malta, and we performed in the original home of the Knights, the 1690 St. Lawrence Church. Luther College also has close ties to Malta, having had many students come from the archipelago, as well as through the research of emeritus professors Warren Berg and Uwe Rudolf.

Our Abendmusik is another Catherine McMichael composition, *Pax*, originally part of her *Rose Quartet*, and later arranged by Mrs. McMichael for band.

Faculty Guest Artists

Dr. Paul Morton, trumpet, serves as Professor of Trumpet and Jazz Studies at the University of Louisiana-Lafayette (UL-L), and has been on the faculty of Lutheran Summer Music for most years since 1996. He performs with the Acadiana Symphony, Louisiana Brass Quintet, and the UL-L Faculty Jazz Combo. In recent years, he has performed in Russia, Belgium, Hong Kong, and Canada. In December and January, he will tour China with Windiana Concert Band, serving as soloist and principal trumpet.

Penny Hogan, soprano, holds degrees in voice from Simpson College and the University of Michigan, and she is active in the National Association of Teachers of Singing. Professor Hogan teaches at the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor. She has enjoyed a successful career in opera, music theatre, oratorio, and as a concert recitalist, including an appearance as guest soloist in Carnegie Hall.

George Hogan, bass, teaches at the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor. He has performed in Europe and nearly every opera house in North America, as well as a prestigious debut with the Australian Opera in Sydney. Other accolades include a Sullivan Career Grant, Luciano Pavarotti Competition, San Francisco Opera Auditions, San Francisco Merola Opera Program, George London Voice Competition, National Public Radio, Live from Lincoln Center, and the EMI recording label.

Gregory Peterson, organ, is college organist, handbell choir director, and chair of the music department at Luther College. He has performed in important venues throughout North America and Europe, as well as national and regional conferences of the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians. Dr. Peterson earned degrees from Luther College, Yale University, and the University of Iowa. He undertook additional study at the Gothenburg International Organ Academy in Sweden.

Conductor

Jeffrey Scott Doebler serves as professor music and director of music education and bands at Valparaiso University, where he also conducted the handbell choir for many years. His previous experience includes public school teaching in Emmetsburg, IA, and Shakopee, MN. He is equally effective when working with younger students, older students, and professional musicians. Dr. Doebler earned music education degrees from Luther College (B.A.), Valparaiso University (M.M.), and the University of Minnesota (Ph.D.). He has served Lutheran Summer Music as concert band conductor, handbell choir conductor (founder), summer program director, and faculty affairs coordinator.

Professor Doebler's career of 32 years in music education has achieved a unique balance of conducting, teacher preparation, leadership in the profession, and working with musicians from the beginning through professional levels, but all aspects of his vocation have had an ultimate focus on teaching. Dr. Doebler has been recognized for teaching excellence by peers, colleagues, and students. During the sesquicentennial year of Valparaiso University, he was named one of the 150 most influential people in VU's first 150 years. Dr. Doebler is a recipient of the Carlo A. Sperati Award from Luther College for outstanding achievement in the field of music. He was named Outstanding University Music Educator of the Year by the Indiana Music Educators Association, and also received the Chicagoland Outstanding Music Educator Award from Quinlan & Fabish Music. Professor Doebler is the 2005 recipient of the Valparaiso University Alumni Association Distinguished Teaching Award. He has been honored by Sigma Alpha lota with its national award, Friend of the Arts, and Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia recognized him with the Orpheus Award "for significant and lasting contributions to the cause of music in America."

Professor Doebler is active throughout the year as a guest conductor, consultant, and clinician, and has appeared professionally in more than 25 states, Canada, Malta, Australia, New Zealand, and China. In a typical

year, Dr. Doebler works with over 3,000 students. He has served as community music conductor, church music director, and director of Royal Brass Ensembles for the Minnesota Renaissance Festival. As a high school teacher, Dr. Doebler earned a reputation for leading the transformation of struggling bands into model programs. He was also active in site-based management and district-wide strategic planning. At the university level, his interpretations, repertoire selection, conducting, and leadership have been highly praised. Dr. Doebler has conducted in many famous venues around the world, including the Sydney Opera House (Australia), Severance Hall (Cleveland), and the Oriental Performance Hall (Shanghai).

Dr. Doebler is a former president of the Indiana Music Educators Association, and currently serves as state editor. He is president of the Indiana Bandmasters Association (IBA). For the IBA, he regularly conducts the All-Region and All-District Honor Bands. He conducted the All-State Band in 2011 and the Junior All-State Band in 2014. He is the first person to conduct at all four levels of IBA honor bands. Dr. Doebler is founder and conductor of a professional-level concert band, Windiana, which has completed eight concert tours of China, performing live and on television for millions of people. He was recently named conductor of the nearly 150-year-old Michigan City Municipal Band.

She has appeared with the Pine Mountain Music Festival, Fargo Moorhead Opera, Opera Omaha, Central City Opera, Minnesota Opera, Valley Chamber Chorale, St. Catherine University Choral Society, the Bakken Trio, Plymouth Symphony, Duluth-Superior Symphony Orchestra, Metropolitan Symphony Orchestra, Consortium Carissimi, and Nautilus Music-Theater, among others. Weiss teaches voice at the Mount Olivet School of Music in Minneapolis, MN, and has taught at the University of Minnesota, Lawrence University, and Luther College.

Bruce Atwell has performed throughout the United States, Europe and Asia as an orchestral musician and soloist.
