George Hogan, bass, has performed in Europe and nearly every opera house in North America, including a prestigious debut with the Australian Opera in Sydney. His studies also include the Academy of Vocal Arts in Philadelphia. Accolades include Sullivan Career Grant from the Sullivan Foundation, Luciano Pavarotti Competition, San Francisco Opera Auditions, San Francisco Merola Opera Program, George London Voice Competition, NPR Radio, Live from Lincoln Center, and the EMI label. He is assistant professor of music at the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor in Belton, TX.

Michael Scarbrough is professor of voice at Abilene Christian University where he teaches vocal pedagogy, private voice, and is the conductor for opera workshop. He holds degrees from McMurry University, Scarritt College, and Arizona State University. His students are accepted into such graduate programs as Cincinnati Conservatory, Florida State University, and Boston Conservatory, and sing professionally. In addition, he works with several professional singers in an advisory capacity. He is active in the National Association of Teachers of Singing and serves as the singing specialist for the Voice Institute of West Texas. This is his seventh season at LSM.

Bruce Atwell has performed throughout the United States, Europe and Asia as an orchestral musician and soloist. A professor of music at the University of Wisconsin Oshkosh, Atwell maintains a busy teaching and performance schedule, with principal horn positions with the Milwaukee Ballet Orchestra, the Green Bay Symphony, the Fox Valley Symphony, and the Oshkosh Symphony. His recording "Baroque Music for Horn and Strings" with the St. Petersburg Chamber Philharmonic was recently released on the Centaur Label and has received critical acclaim.

**Dylan Thomas Chmura-Moore**, D.M.A., is assistant professor of music at University of Wisconsin Oshkosh. He is also an active solo, chamber, and orchestral musician and recently has performed with Madison Symphony Orchestra, Green Bay Symphony Orchestra, Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra, Fox Valley Symphony Orchestra, Dal Niente, Con Vivo!, and Isthmus Brass. Chmura-Moore can be heard on Mode, Summit, EuroArts, Albany, TZADIK, and the Accentus record label. Chmura-Moore is a graduate of University of Wisconsin-Madison, New England Conservatory, and Baldwin-Wallace Conservatory.

Paul Morton serves as professor of trumpet and coordinator of jazz studies at the University of Louisiana at Lafayette School of Music. In Lafayette, he performs with the Acadiana Symphony, the Rapides Symphony, the Louisiana Brass Quintet, and the Cypress Lake Sextet (UL Jazz Faculty). He regularly performs and presents master classes across the United States. International engagements have included performances in Russia, Belgium, Hong Kong, and Canada. Paul has been on the LSM faculty since 1996.

Heather Armstrong is associate professor of oboe and theory at Luther College and the principal oboist of the Waterloo-Cedar Falls Symphony, with whom she premiered an oboe concerto by Brooke Joyce this season. She joined the faculty of Lutheran Summer Music in 2010. Heather received her DMA and MM degrees from the Eastman School of Music, and her BM degree from Houghton College. She has also studied at the Banff Centre and the Chautauqua Institution. She is dedicated to supporting and performing new music and has received numerous grants to support the commissioning and performing of new pieces.

Lori Baruth, associate professor of clarinet, joined the faculty at Morehead State University in 2007. Baruth earned her D.M.A. from the Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music (2010), and her M.M., B.M., and B.M.E. from The Ohio State University (2004 and 1999). She studied with Richie Hawley, Steve Cohen, James Pyne, and Donald McGinnis. Dr. Baruth has performed in orchestras in Kentucky, Ohio, and West Virginia and in recitals across the USA, Brazil, and Italy. Baruth is a co-founder of Trifecta!, and a member of the Baird Winds and Movére quintets. She has coached and adjudicated events across the country.

David Oyen is professor of bassoon and music theory at Morehead State University. He studied bassoon with Robert Wisneskey, Gary Echols, Günter Pfitzenmaier, Stephan Krings and Christopher Weait. He is a board member and principal bassoonist of the Cave Run Symphony Orchestra and regularly performs with the Lexington Philharmonic and the Huntington Symphony on bassoon and contra. At MSU, he regularly performs with the Baird Winds and Trifecta! Oyen has also performed at several International Double Reed Society Conferences. Oyen is currently Immediate Past President of the Kentucky Music Teachers Association.

Hannah Leffler has held faculty positions at Luther College, the University of Northern Iowa, and the Northeast Iowa School of Music. She performs frequently with the Oklahoma City Philharmonic and is a substitute for the Waterloo-Cedar Falls and Dubuque Symphony Orchestras. Leffler holds degrees from the University of Northern Iowa (M.M.), and Oklahoma City University (B.M.), where she was a student of Parthena Owens. She has also studied with Stefán Ragnar Höskuldsson, principal flutist of the Metropolitan Opera. In 2012, Leffler was named the winner of the prestigious NFA Orchestra Audition Competition.

Colin Young, saxophone, is an active solo and chamber musician, performing regularly with the piano trio Tres, the Des Moines Symphony, and the Des Moines Metro Concert & Big Band. As a member of the saxophone quartet Axius, Young won prizes at the Fischoff Chamber Music Competition, the Music Teachers National Association Chamber Music Competition and the North American Saxophone Alliance Saxophone Quartet Competition. He currently serves on the faculties of Drake University, Grandview University, and Grinnell College. Young is working towards his D.M.A. in saxophone performance and pedagogy at the University of Iowa.

#### **PROGRAM NOTES**

As I was pondering the LSM Festival Choir program for this summer, my desire was to provide the singers with "a little bit of everything." I rarely program entire concerts based upon a singular theme, as I find that I "force" pieces that I wouldn't normally choose. Instead, I find great satisfaction in telling a story through a few pieces that collectively celebrate themes. That is my wish for you tonight... to enjoy the stories we tell. Tonight there is a little something for everyone. You will hear choral masterpieces, contemporary programmatic music, hymn arrangements, a world premiere, and fresh interpretations of timeless texts. For me, that eclectic array of music is exciting and fascinating.

Throughout the month, my daily reminder to the students was to push themselves to become better musical leaders. LSM serves not by celebrating the success of the musicians during Festival Week (although you will hear some inspiring music); rather, its mission is to develop young musicians and send them to an impactful return home where they will be better equipped to influence the music in their home congregations and schools. I know it did for me in the summer of 1991, and I hope it does the same for these singers 23 years later.

#### **Andrew Last**

The Phyllis and Richard Duesenberg Concert Choir Chair

Dr. Andrew Last is assistant professor of music at Luther College, where he conducts the 100-voice Collegiate Chorale and the 90-voice first-year men's ensemble Norsemen, as well as teaches private voice and conducting. Last is part of a vital choral program at Luther College that includes four choral faculty, nearly 600 singers, six choral ensembles, numerous regional and national ACDA convention performances, and annually presents the nationally broadcast Christmas at Luther performances. Prior to his appointment, Last served on the voice faculty of Concordia University (NE). Last holds a D.M.A. in choral conducting from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, where he was named a Hixon-Lied Fellow. He received his M.M. from Northern Arizona University and his B.A. in music education and voice from Luther College. Dr. Last is a member of the music honor society Pi Kappa Lambda and the academic honor society of Phi Kappa Phi. His high school teaching experience includes positions at both Xavier High School in Cedar Rapids, IA, as well as Tipton High School in lowa. A frequent clinician and guest conductor around the United States and abroad (leading choirs in Namibia, South Africa, and Guam), Last is a member of the American Choral Directors Association.
