Kirsti Petraborg teaches at St. Joseph's School of Music, as well as having a private teaching studio based in the Twin Cities area. Founder of the Calla String Quartet as well as founding member of the Meadowlark String Quartet, Kirsti is an avid chamber musician and performs throughout the Twin Cities as well as with the Eau Claire Chamber Players. She is also currently the principal violist of the Southwest Minnesota Orchestra as well as Exultate Chamber Orchestra. Kirsti received her doctoral degree in Viola Performance at the University of Minnesota with Korey Konkol. She has played professionally with the Duluth-Superior Symphony Orchestra and the LaCrosse Symphony Orchestra.

Dave Carbonara attended the Juilliard School for his B.M. and M.M. in bass performance. He spent 17 years performing in the Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra in New Orleans before moving to the Twin Cities in 2008. He has also performed with the Jacksonville Symphony, Fort Worth Symphony, Virginia and Duluth Symphonies (both as principal bass), and Music in the Mountains Festival in Colorado. He was on faculty at Tulane, Southeastern Louisiana University, and the University of Louisiana-Lafayette. Carbonara currently freelances, is a bass coach for Greater Twin Cities Youth Symphonies, runs two string programs with his violinist wife, and maintains a private studio.

She teaches violin at the Alabama School of Fine Arts and serves as the President for the Alabama chapter of the American String Teachers Association. Nordlund plays in the Tuscaloosa Symphony Orchestra and teaches at the Community Music School of the University of Alabama. A native of South Carolina, Caroline received her Bachelor of Music, summa cum laude, from the University of South Carolina and a Master of Music degree from Northwestern University.

Tess Varley, Bay Area violinist, performs with a variety of orchestras, ensembles and popular artists. Recent highlights include performing as concertmaster of the Tanglewood Music Center Orchestra under the baton of composer and conductor John Williams and an appearance with the New World Symphony under Michael Tilson Thomas. Current orchestral engagements include the Reno Philharmonic, Fresno Philharmonic, and Monterey Symphony. She has performed with artists such as the Trans-Siberian Orchestra, Michael Buble, and Journey. Tess is a graduate of Boston University and the San Francisco Conservatory of Music and maintains a private teaching studio in San Francisco.
