I therefore declare to you the entire forgiveness of all your sins, in the name of the Father, and of the + Son, and of the Holy Spirit.



Parting water stood and trembled as the captives passed on through, washing off the chains of bondage — channel to a life made new.


Cleansing water once at Jordan closed around the one foretold, opened to reveal the glory ever new and ever old.

After receiving the bread, two chalices will follow—the first for drinking, the second for intinction. The bread is gluten free and dairy free. Those not receiving the bread and wine are welcome to come forward with arms crossed to receive a blessing.



When you came to this community, we rejoiced to welcome you. Here you have come to know and to share in God's loving purpose for you and all creation.


God has blessed you in this community, and God has blessed us through you.
