

South Side (Helge Center)	 ³Who may ascend the mountain of the LORD, and who may stand in God's holy place? * ⁴Those of innocent hands and puri- ty of heart, who do not swear on God's being, nor do they pledge by what is false.
North Side (Harre Union)	 ⁵They shall receive blessing from the LORD and righteousness from the God of their salvation. * ⁶Such is the generation of those who seek you, O LORD, of those who seek your face, O God of Jacob.
South Side (Helge Center)	 ⁷Lift up your heads, O gates; and be lifted up, O ever- lasting doors, that the King of glory may come in. * ⁸Who is this King of glory? The LORD, strong and mighty, the LORD, might- y in battle!
All	 ⁹Lift up your heads, O gates; and be lifted up, O ever- ¹ lasting doors, that the King of glory ¹ may come in. * ¹⁰Who is this ¹ King of glory? Truly, the LORD of hosts is the ¹ King of glory.

God of all creation, open our hearts that Christ, the King of glory, may enter and rule our lives. Give us clean hands and pure hearts, that we may stand in your presence and receive your blessing through the same Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord.
