At the river your Son was baptized by John and anointed with the Holy Spirit. By water and your Word you claim us as daughters and sons, making us heirs of your promise and servants of all.

We praise you for the gift of water that sustains life, and above all we praise you for the gift of new life in Jesus Christ. Shower us with your Spirit, and renew our lives with your forgiveness, grace, and love.

To you be given honor and praise through Jesus Christ our Lord in the unity of the Holy Spirit, now and forever. **Amen.**

Our Lord Jesus Christ welcome you to this meal of the baptized. The crucified and risen Christ is truly present in the Lord's Supper, giving us his body and blood as food and drink. Worshipers are invited to come forward to one of three stations that will be located around the Table, at the direction of the ushers. After receiving the bread, two chalices will follow—the first for drinking, the second for intinction (dipping the bread in the wine). The bread is gluten and dairy free. Those not receiving the bread and cup are welcome to come forward with arms crossed to receive a blessing.
